A Discussion afternoon with a video stimulus from **Penn and Teller**

On the value of Skeptical thinking

Warning! Warning! The video programs we will present contain language which may test the limits of individual capacity for vulgarisms and naughty bits.

They defy labels, and at times, good taste. They've performed together for 30 years; skewering the genre of magic, their sold-out audiences, and themselves --

very often all at the same time, within one mind-boggling evening. Their latest project, "**Penn & Teller: Bullshit!**" for the Showtime network, is in its fourth season.

The controversial show, which has received six Emmy nominations and the 2004 WGA award for Outstanding Comedy/Variety Series, tackles the frauds and fakes behind such topics as talking to the dead, alien abductions and feng shui.



Penn & Teller have written three best-selling books, *Cruel Tricks for Dear Friends*, *How to Play with Your Food*, and *How to Play in Traffic*; and penned pieces in outlets ranging from The New York Times to Playboy.

Can democracy Succeed?

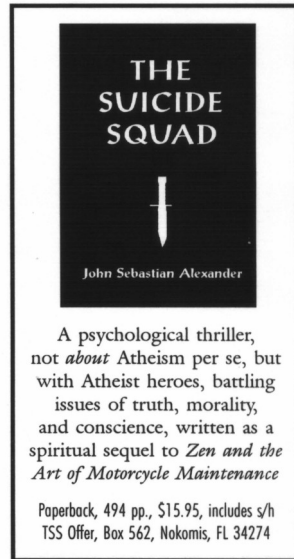
The Moveable Feast ...
