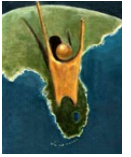

Humanists Champion Battle to Protect Non-Christians

(Washington, D.C., November 22, 2017) The Appignani Humanist Legal Center (AHLC) champions another battle to protect the separation of church and state. Governor Jim Justice of West Virginia received a letter today from the AHLC regarding his recent proclamation of the week of November 19-25, 2017 to be named "Christian Heritage Week" in West Virginia. The proclamation declares in part: "Thanksgiving week is an appropriate time to center attention on our thanks to Almighty God for His great and good Providence and for the Christian faith." Making numerous references to prayer, worship, Bible reading, and other religious elements, Governor Justice's proclamation can only be understood as an official government endorsement of Christianity.

In a letter to the governor, AHLC senior counsel, Monica Miller, wrote, "It is clear that this proclamation violates the First Amendment's Establishment Clause. We recognize that you and other elected officials may feel that protecting *Continued on Page 4*

In general, secular people believe that the promotion of happiness along with the mitigation of suffering are important social and political goals. What separates the secularist approach to the question is the willingness to test practical policies with measurable reports of how people feel about the everyday experience of life. This contrasts with dogmatic religious and political advocates who sublimate indexes of human comfort and satisfaction to the realization of certain large scale changes that favor the hegemony of their philosophical perspective.

But since human needs, desires, and capacities are so varied, a society that is expansive in its tolerance for differences in ideas and behavior in its public square is more successful. This directly challenges the traditional authoritarianism that has motivated so many throughout history, and has caused so much grief through war and violence, poverty and indifference.

But we are learning as a species, that things can be different. Find out how much different when TBCoR presents our Darwin day program on February 3rd.

What is required is a few longtime humanists willing to take on the relatively small effort to secure a library meeting room once a month, post a few notices here and there (including this newsletter), and show up to lead a discussion, share a little knowledge; give something to the future.

As Isaac Asimov, former AHA president, is quoted as saying, "Since you can't take it with you, send it on ahead." Humanism is as much in need of good followership as it is of effective leadership. Now is the time to do your part in either category. We can help.

the majority religion will be seen as a popular gesture, but your constitutional obligation requires that you respect the rights of religious minorities, and all citizens who value secular government, by refraining from such actions."

The AHLC goes on to demand assurances that "Christian Heritage Week" and similar events will not be repeated, and that Governor Justice's office will not issue similar proclamations endorsing religion in the future. If such assurances are not received, litigation may follow.

"Anyone, religious or not, can see that the purpose of a Christian Heritage Week is to promote Christianity," said Roy Speckhardt, executive director of the American Humanist Association. "That's wrong because government endorsement of a particular religion subverts Thomas Jefferson's wall of church state separation. Everyone is entitled to be represented by a government that does not elevate one's worldview over all others."

We are coming unmoored from our history, the Constitution, the better angels of our nature, our highest values, and our collective solidarity as Humans and Americans. In the words of David Frum:

“We are living through the most dangerous challenge to the free government of the United States that anyone alive has encountered. What happens next is up to you and me.”

Accordingly, we are here because our political dialogue—never gentle—has become course, violent, and mendacious.

We are here, because of the growing wealth gap between a small oligarchy and the rest of us. Three billionaires reportedly have more wealth than the bottom 60% of American workers. We are here to counter the power and influence of “Dark Money” that has corrupted the political process and contaminated the very soul of democracy.

We are here because we remember Dwight Eisenhower’s warning about the effects of the military industrial complex and the perils of Empire and those long ago by James Madison on the threat standing armies pose to democracy.

We are here to oppose ongoing attempts to distort the will of the people by suppressing their right to vote in fairly drawn voting districts.

We are here because 3 million Americans are in prison and millions more live on the edge of destitution.

We are here because 30,000 of us die each year in a hail of gunfire because a small minority believes that the right to own guns supersedes our right to life.

We are here to oppose a tax system that favors those needing no help and allows the unscrupulous to hide their money in overseas accounts and avoid paying their fair share of support for the country that made them rich.

We are here because our political language, in Rev. William Barber’s words “is too puny for the crises we face.”

We are here to defend science, facts, honest dialogue and the hard-won gains of the Enlightenment.

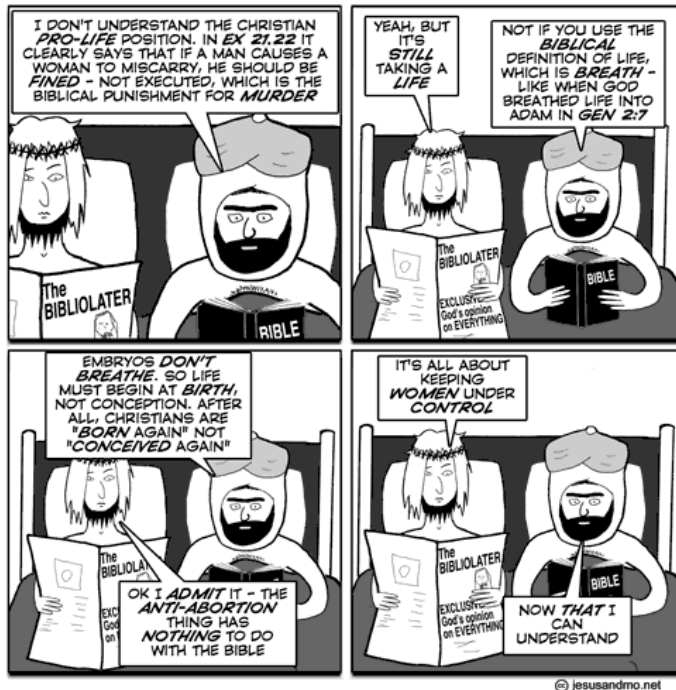


CFI's all new "Point of Inquiry" Podcast

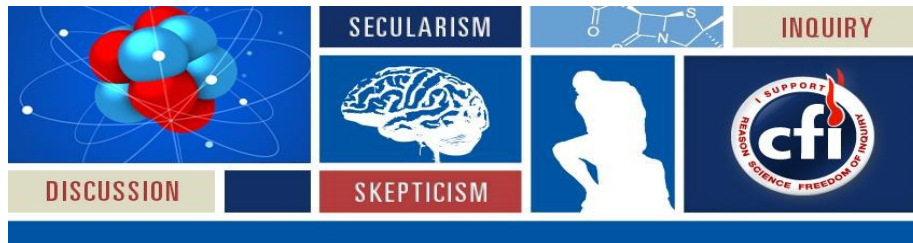
- 1) Be a CFI Member ([Planet level or above](#)).

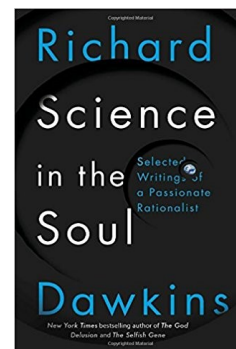


"Science and the Public" Master of Education program

A very brief primer on skepticism

Skepticism is nothing new. In ancient Greece, Pyrrho of Elis (360-270 BC) questioned everything and withheld assenting to all beliefs. The Roman Sextus Empiricus (160-210 AD), who idolized Pyrrho, took skepticism one step further and developed a very sophisticated methodology for questioning the foundations of all types of knowledge. This school of skepticism, known as Pyrrhonism, sought to [free minds from the disturbance](#) of unfounded beliefs. Much later, one of the greatest modern philosophers, David Hume (1711-1776 AD), drank from the same fountain as these ancients. Although he had positive philosophical beliefs and contributed to fields like economics, history, and proto-psychology, Hume laid siege to many sacred cows like causation, [foundationalism](#), the design argument, traditional ethics, and miracles.

These Pyrrhonian skeptics, despite their brilliance, did not get too far when it came to attaining positive knowledge about the world around us. This is because their skepticism was predominantly focused on tearing down or undermining knowledge. Not constructing it. Scientific skepticism differs from this philosophical skepticism because it is not satisfied with merely questioning beliefs. It also wants to find out the how the world actually works and which methods are best for exploring it. To succeed at this task, the skeptics of our age have embraced, as Michael Shermer put it, "the most powerful tool ever devised for understanding how the world works." This tool is science.

What impresses skeptics about science is its long track record of successful prediction and potent application in fields like computing, medicine, and engineering. In the short time since the Scientific Revolution, science has explained the origin of species and shown us that our Milky Way galaxy is one among billions and billions. Most notably, it has eradicated diseases like Polio, made instantaneous communication around the world possible, and put men on the moon. The skeptic is equally as impressed by science's methodology. Unlike traditional ways of looking at the world, science is built on probability rather than certainty. This means that all knowledge in science is fallible and can be revised if new information becomes available. This track record and its openness to new ideas is why skeptics are confident that science is the way to go.

Five tips for a Humanist Xmas

Ultra-conservative politicians seek to dismantle state/church separation

Who ARE these people?

I am a Christian, a conservative, and a Republican, in that order," is what Vice President Mike Pence says of himself. The improbable ascension of Donald Trump to the presidency of the United States has brought in appointments to the West Wing and several department heads that seem focused primarily on converting our nation to a theocracy.

In 2002, Pence delivered a speech in the House of Representatives, a passionate repudiation of evolution aimed at continuing the common rhetorical device of evolution deniers: that evolution is just a theory and should be presented as such.

Pence begins by discussing Charles Darwin talking about how he "offered a theory of the origin of species which we've come to know as evolution. Charles Darwin never thought of evolution as anything other than a theory. He hoped that someday it would be proven by the fossil record but did not live to see that, nor have we."

He bemoans the Scopes Monkey Trial saying we have "seen the consequences" in the following years, lamenting the fact the biblical story of creation is not taught in every biology class around the country alongside Darwin. It is unclear if Pence is either willfully or unknowingly misrepresenting the scientific definition of the word "theory". In scientific terms, a theory is the highest designation of know-ledge and represents something that has been rigorously tested using the scientific method. Ninety-eight percent of scientists surveyed understand that humans evolved over time, so among experts, this is not a debate anyone is having. With Pence as VP, how will this matter to the American public?

Many court battles have been fought over the fact personal religious beliefs are just that—personal—and have no business making an appearance inside a science classroom. The fact that Pence felt strongly enough to make this speech inside a house of government reveals he does not see religion and science as two separate entities. The symbolism of anti-evolution rhetoric those like Pence use undermines scientific progress, as evolution is a common thread in many National Science Foundation and National Institutes of Health research programs from biology to psychology to medicine.

Meanwhile, twice-removed Alabama Supreme Court Chief Justice Roy Moore stands ready to be elected to the vacated U.S. senate seat of Jeff Sessions who stepped down to become the nation's Attorney General. *Continued on page 17*

Humanist Families of Greater Tampa

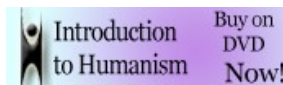

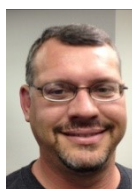

....dismantling state/church separation

"Our rights come from God," says the 70-year-old Baptist. "The Constitution was founded upon God. It was made for moral and religious people. It is the fallen nature of man that the Constitution meant to restrain." Secretary of Education Head Betsy DeVos' opposition to public education is well documented and her determination to use taxpayer funds for private, including parochial, schools is unacceptable.

In an opinion piece published in the *New York Times* by Katherine Stewart (Dec. 13, 2016), she states that "At a 2001 gathering of conservative Christian philanthropists, DeVos singled out education reform as a way to 'advance God's kingdom.' In an interview, she and her husband, Richard DeVos Jr., said that school choice would lead to 'great kingdom gain.'"

Trump's nominee for Attorney General, Jeff Sessions, has a record antagonism to state/church separation. At the Republican National Convention, Sessions criticized Sonia Sotomayor for not being religious enough. He stated, "if you have secularization in the world and don't believe in a higher being, maybe you don't believe there is any truth."

At the conservative Faith and Freedom Coalition's Road to Majority conference last year Sessions stated this, talking about Sotomayor: "...this is a postmodern, relativistic, secular mindset and I believe it's directly contrary to the founding of our republic..." According to Right Wing Watch, he was responding to her quote of legal scholar observation that in the law 'there is no objective stance but only a series of perspectives—no neutrality, no escape from choice in judging,' an acknowledgment of the hidden assumptions and biases that all judges bring to the law."

Mr. Sessions also stated he regarded Justice Scalia as "one of the greatest justices ever to sit on the Supreme Court." This is troubling because Scalia, in a speech to Colorado Christian University said the following: "I think the main fight is to dissuade Americans from what the secularists are trying to persuade them to be true: that the separation of church and state means that the government cannot favor religion over non-religion." Scalia also stated that the worries over religion in government are "utterly absurd." According to an article in *Salon*, however, he attributed the spread of atheism to Satan, who was "getting people not to believe in him or in god. He's much more successful that way."

our commitment to human dignity calls on us to join the effort to preserve and extend democracy and take on the responsibilities that go with that privilege.

We are here, in short, to affirm the great truth that out of many differences we are one people. We are here to reaffirm our highest values and the original intentions of the Founding generation. We are here to begin work to repair and strengthen democratic institutions, procedures, and “habits of heart.” This is our Great Work—the work of patriots in the highest sense.

Now, the words above are easy to say but the work won’t be easy to do. There will be casualties and losses along the way. But democracy has never been easy. It has always had its critics. Plato thought it was the road to tyranny. Aristotle wasn’t much more sanguine. The founding fathers of our Republic were wary of it. John Adams believed that democracies always end by committing suicide. James Madison believed that with luck democracy in America might last a century, but not longer. English writer E. M. Forster could give it only two cheers, H. L. Mencken none at all, believing people incorrigibly stupid. Economist Joseph Schumpeter likewise thought voters became dumber when they entered the political arena. Robert Dahl, perhaps the greatest student of democracy in the 20th century once described himself as a “pessimist” about its future.

Winston Churchill captured our predicament in his famous observation that democracy was the worst form of

government except for all the others ever tried.

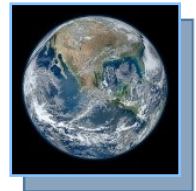
In short, democracy is everywhere and always a wager that enough people would know enough and care enough and be wise enough to participate honorably and well in the conduct of the public business. The only sure foundation of democracy is a well-educated and well-informed citizenry that is tolerant of differences, good hearted, merciful, and farsighted. Democracy is also a wager on the durability, fairness, accountability, transparency, and integrity of public institutions and the even-handed administration of justice.

Democracy, however, is a process, never a thing finished once and for all. It needs constant repair, vigilance, and revitalization. We are here to carry on that work in our time of peril. The ground rules are these:

1. Our deliberations are neither conservative nor liberal.
2. Our present situation—however you define it—is a symptom of deeper causes and of a long history that stretches back decades, perhaps centuries.
3. We are not focused on the crisis of the day, but on the work of repair and the strengthening democratic institutions, procedures, and the habits of mind and heart that undergird democracy.
4. Democracy is a wager, and I believe that we here today are unanimous in our willingness to bet on we, the people and government truly of, by, and for the people.

Political scientist Michael Sandel once wrote: “The hope of our time rests with those who can summon the conviction and restraint to make sense of our condition and repair the civic life on which democracy depends.”

That is our charge.
