The Evolution of Human Happiness





Trend = 0.013 Deg C/Decade




Catastrophic Anthropogenic Global Warming

Pensacola Monument makes Humanists Cross

The American Humanist Association's (AHA) Appignani Humanist Legal Center presented its arguments June 14th before the United States District Court for the Northern District of Florida, seeking <u>summary judgment</u> in a lawsuit aimed at preventing the continued state sponsorship of a religious monument.

The AHA in conjunction with the Freedom From Religion Foundation (FFRF) filed a lawsuit in 2015 on behalf of Pensacola residents who felt that a large cross, located in a city park and maintained by the city government, represented a troubling elevation of the Christian faith above other beliefs. The request for summary judgment, filed in April of this year, prompts the court to make a decision regarding whether the massive Christian display violates the Establishment clause of the First Amendment.

"Binding legal precedent requires the removal of the city's cross," said Monica Miller, Senior Counsel at the Appignani Humanist Legal Center. "Such an overt Christian monolith endorsed and displayed by the city is a clear violation of the Establishment Clause, and today we presented our arguments urging the court to respect all citizens' First Amendment rights."

Humanist Psychology

Humanistic, humanism and humanist are terms in psychology relating to an approach which studies the whole person, and the uniqueness of each individual. Essentially, these terms refer the same approach in psychology.

Humanism is a <u>psychological</u> <u>perspective</u> that emphasizes the study of the whole person. Humanistic psychologists look at human behavior not only through the eyes of the observer, but through the eyes of the person doing the behaving.

Sometimes the humanistic approach is called

Sometimes the humanistic approach is called phenomenological. This means that personality is studied from the point of view of the individual's subjective experience. For Rogers the focus of psychology is not behaviour (Skinner), the unconscious (Freud), thinking (Wundt) or the human brain but how individuals perceive and interpret events. Rogers is therefore important because he redirected psychology towards the study of the self.

The humanistic approach in psychology developed as a rebellion against what some psychologists saw as the limitations of the behaviorist and psychodynamic psychology. The humanistic approach is thus often called the "third force" in psychology after psychoanalysis and behaviorism (Maslow, 1968).

Humanistic psychology begins with the existential assumptions that phenomenology is central and that people have free will. Personal agency is the humanistic term for the exercise of free will. Personal agency refers to the choices we make in life, the paths we go down and their consequences.

Change or Warming?

LONDON, June 22 (Thomson Reuters Foundation) - When it comes to climate speak, labels seem to matter: the American public - particularly Republicans - are more likely to say they doubt the existence of "global warming" than "climate change", according to researchers at Cornell University.

In a survey, 74 percent of Republicans polled said they believed that climate change is happening, but only 66 percent said they believed in global warming. In contrast, 94 percent of Democrats said they believed in both.

The reasons why people discredit climate science may be because they do not like the policies being proposed to tackle the problem, said study co-author Jonathon Schuldt, assistant professor of communication at

"Acknowledging the reality of global warming or climate change may lead to new government regulations on businesses, which goes against core conservative values," he said.

"So, telling a pollster that the phenomenon isn't happening may reflect something about a person's general policy preferences, not just their level of certainty that the global climate is changing."

U.S. President Donald Trump's tweets are less likely to speak about climate change than global warming - which he has described as a hoax. In all, 106 of his tweets mentioned "global warming" and 36 said "climate change", the researchers found.

"Our results suggest that Trump's emphasis on 'global warming' may be an effective rhetorical strategy that resonates with his Republican constituents, who express more skepticism in response to that term in particular," said Schuldt.

But the chasm between Republicans and Democrats on climate science might not be as large as it seems, Schuldt added.

"If you ask people what they think about climate change - not global warming - we find that the partisan gap shrinks by about 30 percent," he said. "There's actually more agreement here than we think."

The effect identified by the researchers is especially relevant given Trump's decision to pull the United States out of the Paris climate agreement, said co-author Peter Enns, associate professor of government.

Trump's announcement on June 1 that he wished to renegotiate the terms of the landmark 195-nation climate deal

was met with dismay by other countries who signed the agreement. Trump has said participating in the accord - which aims to limit global warming to well below 2 degrees Celsius above pre-industrial levels - would undermine the U.S. economy, wipe out jobs, weaken national sovereignty and put his country at a permanent disadvantage.

The Cornell University research was based on a national probability survey of 1,461 U.S. adults carried out in October last year, and published on Wednesday. In Religion, Only A Minority Is Right

Polytheism spread over the planet several thousand years ago to produce a *majority* belief among humans. Almost everyone was a polytheist.

Polytheism lasted thousands of years unopposed by a late arriving monotheism. And then, tardy monotheism arrived.

And then several sects and denominations of monotheism arose. Then other new religions emerged. Then several thousand denominations and even newer religions appeared, so that, today, there is no uniformity in religion and no *majority* religious option at all. In religion, your view is inevitably a minority view.

Whoever you are and whatever your view, you are vastly outnumbered by all the other options combined. You are Protestant, but the vast majority of humanity is not. You are Catholic, the vast majority of humanity is not. You are Orthodox, the vast majority is not. You are Muslim, the vast majority is not. You are Hindu, the vast majority is not. You are Buddhist, the vast majority is not. You are Atheist, the vast majority is not. And on and on with many thousands of religious choices.

Such diversity (which is just a pretty word for 'disagreement') can only mean that a small minority has the correct view and the vast majority is wrong. That the vast majority is wrong is a very powerful proof that real obstacles exist to firm knowledge. Humanity has a mental defect that permits it to be fooled with fake knowledge about religion. Our brains didn't evolve to easily recognize metaphysical truth. And so the vast majority of humans can be hoodwinked over the course of an entire lifetime and indeed over the span of millennia. Some ancient creeds that we label 'dead religions' flourished for thousands of years before they faded away. Do any of us for a moment think those dead religions imparted to their millions of devotees any true knowledge about the way things really are?

For People Who Love Science

Every now and then (read: at least once every week), I come across some self-professed pro-science denizen of the internet who wants to argue about something or other. Often, they like to cite studies in support of their arguments. On several occasions (to the point that I have lost count of exactly how many occasions), I've looked into the methodology of those studies and found that they did not conclusively prove whatever point they were cited to prove. In multiple cases, the studies actually suggested the opposite of whatever claim they had been cited in service of.

Yes, those people "love" science. I have some theories for why this happens so often. They involve presumption of authority and objectivity, lack of scrutiny, fetishism, and as always, media reporting and the systems that hinder accuracy therein.

Often, these people are simply enthusiastic about science insofar as it serves as an authority, which is plenty plausible motive for why they sometimes take a light hand to scrutiny. As someone currently weighing whether or not to enter a field in the social sciences where the methods used can be manipulated to fit desirability or grab headlines, I understand too well how easy it is to misrepresent facts and findings, even when it's not being done on purpose. Social and evolutionary psychology are absolutely rife with issues like these.

That is why it's important to demand significantly more intense scrutiny. That is why it's important to not see science as an entity that stands alone from what we do with it, that we can use as some sort of a trump card, instead of what it actually is: a way to get to truth. That seems to be the common ground between a lot of pro-science people and people who are outright deniers. The difference seems to often just be that the former see science as an inherently (almost miraculously) objective monolithic authority and the latter see it as an inherently suspect monolithic authority.



A single voice ... Magnified gets results ~ Laura Moser: Activism one day at a time

The day after the election, Laura Moser, a writer, mother of two and an EDF member, just wanted to stay in bed. She felt scared and full of uncertainty about the world her kids would grow up in. "Did we just throw away our one chance to put the brakes on climate change?" she wondered.

In the weeks that followed, Moser managed her anxiety about the new administration by donating to organizations working to protect people and the planet.

"We're relying on nonprofits like EDF now more than ever," she said.

Still, she wanted to do more. So with the help of her husband's digital media company, she created Daily Action, a text message-based service that educates subscribers about important issues and makes contacting elected officials quick and easy. Daily Action (dailyaction.org) now has over 250,000 subscribers.

"Before I had kids, I used to volunteer a lot," said Moser. "Then I just got too busy. But this election has reminded me that taking care of my kids is bigger than packing lunches and getting them places on time: it's about fighting for a cleaner, safer future or them.

"It's up to us now," Moser added.
"Find out what you're good at and do
it. Or find out what no one is doing
and do it. We all just need to do a little
bit more than we have before."



Answering Vaccine Skeptics, SkepDoc's Corner, Harriet Hall, June 14, 2017

The anti-vaccine movement is full of conspiracy theorists who deny the evidence for the effectiveness of vaccines, call vaccines "poisons," think doctors and manufacturers (in collusion with the government) only promote vaccines to boost their incomes, and blame vaccines for all manner of adverse events. These vaccine denialists must not be confused with vaccine skeptics, many of whom are intelligent, well-educated people who trust science but who have legitimate questions and concerns about one or more vaccine. Many of these concerns turn out to be myths promulgated by people who appear to be experts and who sound convincing but who are not reliable sources of information. It's hard for laymen, and even for many doctors, to distinguish the trustworthy sources of information from the untrustworthy. Here are some short answers to some of the most common objections to vaccines. Read the article here.

Chiropractors: Pro and Con, SkepDoc's Corner, Harriet Hall, June 1, 2017

In a recent <u>article</u> in *The New York Times*, pediatrician Aaron Carroll asks us to rethink our biases against chiropractors when it comes to treating bad backs. He points out that lower back pain is a common problem that usually resolves over time, and that interventions that focus on relief of symptoms and allow the body to heal are ideal. He claims that spinal manipulation therapy (SMT) is as effective as medical therapies and as safe, if not safer.

There is a remarkable disconnect between compelling anecdotal evidence and controlled scientific studies. Chiropractors and patients are convinced that SMT works because they have *seen* it work. I have seen it work too. I watched a patient hobble painfully into the exam room, barely able to walk and complaining of excruciating pain. A few minutes later, after spinal manipulation by a physical therapist, he was standing tall, walking normally, and reporting complete relief of his pain. Yet when controlled scientific studies are done, they find little evidence of effectiveness. One study found that SMT was no more effective than giving the patient a pamphlet on back care. A Cochrane review found that SMT was no better than sham interventions. The most favorable systematic review found an improvement in pain, but only of about 10 points on a 100-point scale. So what's going on here? Read the article here.

"We must find ways to convey the beauty and mystery of science to more people. It is for this reason that Stephen Jay Gould, Isaac Asimov, Carl Sagan, Edward O. Wilson and Jacob Bronowski are among my personal heroes. Turning their back on comfortable scientific studies addressed to their colleagues, they turned instead to the public and shared with us their celebration of the human spirit embodied in science and reason. To quote Raymo again (*Skeptics and True Believers*, p. 252), their motto was: "If there be a skeptical star I was born under it, yet I have lived all my days in complete astonishment." That should be *our* motto as well." ~ Terry A. Smiljanich, TBS






WOMFN BEYOND **BELIEF**

An Atheist Celebrant?

An Atheist celebrant officiates and assists with a secular or civil ceremony, such as a wedding, a service to welcome new family members, coming-of-age rituals, end of life services, etc. Celebrants work with people to create a secular experience intended to be uniquely personalized, deep and loving, based on the person's personal philosophy, and not the celebrant's. A celebrant may have suggestions on how to approach the occasion, and if appropriate, the venue and setting, music, and textual sharing's.

Why do we have rituals?

ACLU of Greater Tampa Bay

In the wake of the 2016 outbreak of toxic algae in the St. Lucie River and Estuary and along Florida's Treasure Coast, the ACLU of Florida was asked by members in the region and several environmental organizations to investigate the state's record of transparency with regard to the dissemination of information about the potential grave danger to the public health posed by the algae flow. Specific concern was expressed about the state's performance in delivering needed information evenly to all citizens in affected areas, and whether the state understate scientific evidence of dangers to public health.

The following report was researched with the help of local residents, scientists, media sources, and those state employees who cooperated with an ACLU of Florida investigator.

It is a gross mischaracterization of the wide latitude of freedoms that houses of worship enjoy in the United States to claim that their rights of free speech are being abrogated by the Johnson Amendment. These claims mask the more sinister intentions to channel money directly into political campaigns to influence elections. In 2016, Rev. Jerry Falwell, Jr. was quoted in the New York Times saying that repealing the Johnson Amendment would "create a huge revolution for conservative Christians and for free speech." It is simply false to claim that churches and other houses of worship cannot engage in political speech or that pastors as individuals are unfairly fettered. Houses of worship can engage in political speech, and clergy are free to speak their mind in their personal capacity. The limit on 501(c)(3) organizations, including houses of worship, pertains only to abstaining from endorsing or opposing candidates in political campaigns. More







François Arago, the first to show in 1810 that the surface of the Sun and stars is made of incandescent gas and not solid or liquid, was a prominent physicist of the 19th century. He used his considerable influence to help Fresnel, Ampere and others develop their ideas and make themselves known.

He made many personal contributions to physics, astronomy, geodesy and oceanography, Arago was also an important and influential political man who, for example, abolished slavery in the French colonies. As a humanist, he had very broad cultural interests on a wide range of subjects.





Humanistic studies is a multidisciplinary human science for which humanist values are a source of inspiration. It combines insights gained from philosophy, psychology, sociology, religious and cultural sciences, theory of science and methodology.

Humanistic Studies explores how people respond to existential issues. What makes life worth living? What is the meaning of happiness and prosperity? Which moral and ethical choices are open to us? How do we cope with suffering and sorrow?

Humanistic Studies furthermore explores important contemporary social, political and ethical issues. What does a pluralist society entail? How can we define quality of care and education? How can we pursue sustainable development? How can human rights be guaranteed?
