American scientists are facing censorship on par with that imposed in the USSR under Josef Stalin, Australia's chief scientist Alan Finkel said during a scientific roundtable in Canberra, Australia, on Monday.

"Science is literally under attack," Finkel warned, describing the Trump administration's crackdown on Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) data, which requires political appointees to review scientific research before it is published. Congressional Republicans have also set their sights on gutting the regulatory agency.

"It defies logic. It certainly does longterm harm," Finkel said, and compared the administration's policy to the USSR under

It's reminiscent of the censorship exerted by political officers in the old Soviet Union. Every military commander there had a political officer second-guessing his decisions.

Soviet agricultural science was held back for decades because of the ideology of Trofim Lysenko, who was a proponent of Lamarckism. Stalin loved Lysenko's conflation of science and Soviet philosophy, and used his limitless power to ensure that Lysenko's unscientific ideas prevailed.

Lysenko believed that successive generations of crops could be improved by exposing them to the right environment, and so too could successive generations of Soviet citizens be improved by exposing them to the right ideology.

So while Western scientists embraced evolution and genetics, Russian scientists who thought the same were sent to the gulag. Western crops flourished. Russian crops failed.

"Today, the catch-cry of scientists must be frank and fearless advice," Finkel said, "no matter the opinion of political commissars stationed at the U.S. EPA."

Finkel went on to argue that sound science must inform government policy, the Sydney Morning Herald reported, and said he was proud to be chief scientist in a country where no politician had ever told him what he could and couldn't say. Trump's actions in his first two weeks in office—not to mention his usual rhetoric—have also provoked comparisons with other infamous dictators, such as Adolf Hitler and Kim Jung-un.

- Public Education is a Good Idea!

HR 610 is the start of dismantling of the public school system, requiring states to fund vouchers for private schools (read the <u>bill summary</u>.)

The bill is in the <u>House - Education and the Workforce</u> <u>Committee</u>. You can contact the committee member from Florida, Representative <u>Fredericka Wilson</u> 202-225-4506 or visit <u>her contact page</u> (phone calls are more effective.)

Sample call script: (you will get a staff person, so be nice) "Hi, my name is (your name) and I live in Florida. I am calling in opposition to HR 610. This bill will allow taxpayer money to go to private schools. In the state of Florida, 85% of private schools are religiously affiliated. Private schools can discriminate on who they admit and are exempt from any of the educational requirements of the state.

It also repeals the "No Hungry Kids Act" which requires schools to meet nutritional standards for lunch and breakfast, leaving poor children vulnerable to malnutrition.





Hiccups and Poltergeists

As chronicled in his occasional travelogues, <u>Terry Smiljanich</u> spends his precious time galloping across the globe visiting the world's wonders - the largest telescope (see his column in this issue), Charles Darwin's Galapagos "laboratory," etc. -- while I sit home watching TV. But *my* preferred pastime sometimes actually results in an interesting (at least to me) thought crossing my mind.

For example, in 2007, when programs such as *Today* and *Good Morning America* were fighting over which would be the first to snare St. Petersburg's "Hiccup Girl," I found myself seemingly alone in wondering if perhaps her one-per-second hiccups might be a publicity prank, especially since she was able to talk hiccup-free.

I had no compelling reason to doubt the genuineness of the 17-year-old's situation, for which she had sought the help of multiple physicians, and which resolved spontaneously after five weeks. Yet I recall it reminding me of a Robin Williams skit on *Saturday Night Live* from years earlier, in which his trance-channeling impression appeared more authentic than <u>J.Z. Knight's corny-looking channelings</u>, which were all the rage at the time, of the ancient warrior Ramtha.

The same question occurred to me while watching "Hiccup Girl" as when watching Williams or Knight or, for that matter, Noreen Renier during any of her "psychic" trances: How can one discern the difference between the "real" phenomenon (if it exists) and play-acting? In Renier's case, most of her genuine-appearing "psychic" trances that I have observed have been reenactments of her past cases for TV programs like Psychic Detectives, so we know that she does play-act at times -- at least on those shows.


"Hiccup Girl" Jennifer Mee, now three years older, has recently reemerged as a celebrity, this time for suffering a grave hiccup in judgment. She reportedly has confessed to luring a man to a vacant home on a dark alley so that her boyfriend and another male accomplice could rob him. The victim, shot four times in the struggle, died, and Mee is facing first-degree murder charges.

This news broke on the very day that a Sarasota reporter called hours later to interview me about house-hauntings (see "TBS in the Media" below). During the course of our conversation, I came up with a speculative hypothesis that I suggested he might wish to pursue -- under the condition, of course, that he share the ensuing Pulitzer Prize with me. He was more than agreeable to my caveat, but fearing that his editor wouldn't appreciate him straying from the Sarasota beat, though encouraging me onward, he passed.

The Trump gang is trying to gag scientists - make us shut up, and hide our data. But they're also making scientists gag - want to vomit. So, scientists are fighting back. [Humanists can help!]

Some examples:

1) Scientists are keeping track of how Trump gang is changing the EPA website, with before-and-after photos, and analysis:

There's more about "adaptation" to climate change, and less about how it's caused by carbon emissions.

- 2) The Trump gang is taking animal-welfare data offline. The US Department of Agriculture will no longer make lab inspection results and violations publicly available, citing privacy concerns: http://www.nature.com/news/us-government-takes-animal-welfare-data-offline-1.21428
- 3) The **Environmental Data and Governance Initiative** is working to archive public environmental data. Go to a **data rescue event**:

4) Less relevant, but too fun to ignore, is **Operation "Kiss Our Asses, Release Your Taxes"**. Hundreds of people are planning to gather at 3:30 p.m. on Sunday, Feb. 12th and *moon* Trump Tower in Chicago - that is, aim their naked butts at it. The goal is to get Trump to release his tax returns.

I think people should do this each time he emits an offensive tweet.

5) A new bill would prevent the US government from providing access to geospatial data if it helps people understand housing discrimination. It goes like this:

Notwithstanding any other provision of law, no Federal funds may be used to design, build, maintain, utilize, or provide access to a Federal database of geospatial information on community racial disparities or disparities in access to affordable housing.

Predictably, counter-tweets claiming to come from rebellious employees at the EPA, the Forest Service, the USDA, and NASA sprang up immediately. At The Verge, Rich McCormick says there's reason to believe these claims may be genuine, although none has yet been verified. A lovely head on this post: "On the internet, nobody knows if you're a National Park."

Bailey argues, "with exception perhaps of some minor amount of national security intelligence, there is no good reason that any information, data, studies, and reports that federal agencies produce should be kept from the public and press. In any case, I will be following the Alt Bureaucracy feeds for a while."

NeuroDojo Zen Faulkes posted on how to demand that scientific societies show some backbone. "Ask yourself: "Have my professional societies done anything more political than say, 'Please don't cut funding?'" Will they fight?," he asked.

Scientists associated with the group **500 Women Scientists** donned lab coats and marched in DC as part of the Women's March on Washington the day after Trump's Inauguration, Robinson Meyer reported at the Atlantic. Other groups may be willing to step in when government agencies wimp out. A few days before the Inauguration, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention abruptly and with no explanation cancelled a 3-day meeting on the health effects of climate change scheduled for February. Scientists told Ars Technica's Beth Mole that CDC has a history of running away from politicized issues.

The APHA guy said they simply wanted to head off a potential last-minute cancellation. Yeah, I guess an anticipatory pre-cancellation would do that.

But then – Al Gore to the rescue! He is joining with several health groups—including the American Public Health Association—to hold a one-day meeting on the topic Feb 16 at the Carter Center in Atlanta, CDC's home base. Vox's Julia Belluz reports that it is not clear whether CDC officials will be part of the Gore rescue event.

Think Immigration is not important?

Implementing this policy will be expensive. Hundreds of billions of dollars expensive. No matter which side of the immigration policy aisle you're on, undocumented immigrants generate a lot of economic activity that reverberates throughout the country.

For starters, many undocumented workers actually do pay taxes—to the tune of \$11 billion each year. Being that taxes are the primary source of income for government services, that money covers things like repairing roads, funding fire and police departments, and healthcare programs such as Medicare and Medicaid.

The physical process of removing the estimated 11 million undocumented immigrants that currently live in this country (including legal fees, transportation, and the hiring of more border patrol agents) would cost the U.S. big money—\$400 billion to \$600 billion, according to one center-right public policy group. To get an idea of how much that is, the entire U.S. defense budget—where more than half of our federal budget goes—is just shy of \$600 billion a year.

A crackdown on immigration would also result in a more expensive grocery bill at home. More than half of U.S. farm workers are undocumented, and farms are already having trouble finding enough laborers. The farm bureau estimates that a deportation-only policy could cause an across-the-country price increase—in other words, your steaks, carrots, and strawberries could cost 5-6 percent more. And that's just agriculture. Americans would see higher price tags on a range of expenses including restaurant bills, home construction, hotel stays, and others.

...and what you can do.

Town hall fever is spreading across the nation. You can attend a meeting in your area to make your views on immigration heard to your local politicians. Can't be there in person? A phone call to your congressional representatives also makes a difference.

If you want to support undocumented immigrants, you can <u>donate to the National Immigration Law Center</u>, which helps provide legal representation to low-income families.
