The 2018 election will have consequences for a long time. New districts for US House and state legislative races will be based on the results of the 2020 census are effective starting in 2022 and last until 2030.

In Florida, congressional lines are drawn by the legislature, as a regular statute, subject to gubernatorial veto; the state legislative lines are drawn by the legislature and passed as a joint resolution, which is not subject to gubernatorial veto.

Who is in control in the state makes a huge difference.

Exercising your right to vote and holding politicians accountable is the only way for us to change our government for the better. Atheists are one of the largest religious demographics in our nation. Politicians need to learn that we're not going anywhere. Atheists are not a political monolith. But we all agree that a secular government is a better government.

Are you concerned about any of these issues?

- You want to ensure that you have the right to know about health care options that are available, regardless of religious beliefs of the provider or your employer.
- You don't want government money used to support religious groups.
- You want to ensure that women have a right to decide what health care options to use.
- You know that religious freedom is not a license to discriminate.
- Religious beliefs should not be used as the primary justification for any policy.
- That tradition is a terrible reason to allow religious ideology to remain part of government practices.
- Religious groups should have to pay taxes.


What I learned at the Congress for New Urbanism Savannah, May-2018



Why are we not **Prepared?**



A Boston firm that analyzes potential catastrophic damage reported that our region would lose \$175 billion in a storm the size of Hurricane Katrina. A World Bank study called Tampa Bay one of the 10 most at-risk areas on the globe.

Yet the bay area — greater Tampa, St. Petersburg and Clearwater — has barely begun to assess the rate of sea-level rise and address its effects. Its slow response to a major threat is a case study in how American cities reluctantly prepare for the worst, even though signs of impacts from climate change abound all around.

State leaders could be part of the reason. Republican Gov. Rick Scott's administration has reportedly discouraged employees from using the words "climate change" in official communications. Last year, the Republican-controlled state legislature approved bills allowing any citizen to challenge textbooks and instructional materials, including those that teach the science of evolution and global warming.

As Humanists it is our task to discover the secret world above and within the level of conscious recognition. Using the instruments of reason, & critical thinking, we strive to be at one in understanding both the world that made us, and the one we are inventing.

Each month a new investigation thoughtfully & critically dissects a novel intersection of mind and matter. Be part of it.

At present, we are a small, intimate group meeting in a neighbor-hood library. But we are ambitious, and hope to grow. Ideally, such small discussion groups should appear in every neighborhood. The need is as great as the potential. What is required is a few longtime humanists willing to take on the relatively small effort to secure a library meeting room once a month, post a few notices here and there (including this newsletter), and show up to lead a discussion, share a little knowledge; give something to the future.

Secular Rescue is a program of the Center for Inquiry that identifies those writers, activists, and everyday citizens in countries such as Bangladesh, Pakistan, and Iraq who live under the threat of violence and death. Secular Rescue then provides financial and diplomatic assistance to help these courageous freethinkers escape to safety so they can continue to write, work, and live. Last year, The Atlantic profiled Secular Rescue and its successes, calling

it "The Underground Railroad that rescues atheists."

Skeptic cartoonist Celestia Ward debuts her new column for CFI, **Peeling Onions**,

with a piece on "outrage vampires," those who feed off our knee-jerk anger using deceptive means. In this case, a viral video by "Joey Salads" created to make people seething mad about the scorn faced by breastfeeding moms: "While on the surface it might seem like any publicity is good publicity when it comes to public acceptance of breastfeeding, I can see some very real problems here. Harken back to my informal poll: despite the fact that very few mothers reported harassment from strangers as they nursed, some of those who sought out private spaces did so "out of fear" and admitted to being nervous about what reaction they might get if they nursed in the open."

CFI intern Kayla Bowen has a compelling piece at our Course of Reason blog on how humanists and skeptics handle the topic of obesity: Secular humanist values involve treating people with respect and dignity, and that includes those one might consider to be overweight/unhealthy. If you're still on the fence because you think it's aiding the obesity epidemic to treat fat people like people, then consider that being cruel to them will ultimately make the situation worse. If you can't be a good secular humanist, at least listen to the science.





David Bentley Hart undertook this new translation of the New Testament in the spirit of etsi doctrina non daretur, "as if doctrine is not given." Reproducing the texts' often fragmentary formulations without augmentation or correction, he has produced a pitilessly literal translation, one that captures the texts' impenetrability and unfinished quality while awakening

readers to an uncanniness that often lies hidden beneath doctrinal layers.

The Greek of the New Testament is Koine Greek, a pidgin form with none of the nuances or beauty of Attic/Classical Greek. It is a simple tradesman's form, easy to learn, but of no literary value. Hence, Hart says, "Where an author has written bad Greek ... I have written bad English."

The attempt to translate translations and revise versions in trying to puzzle out what the many varying ancient authors were trying to impart has been a constant frustration, specially to literalists, for whom there are no reliable sources.

That's why I offer this book for your consideration: is there any real value in the Testament?

Is Religion Good for Children? 9

Secular children differ in happiness, mental health, and their grasp of reality. By Mark Joseph Stern

In the United States, conventional wisdom holds that you should raise your child to be religious. Taking the kids to church is the default; leaving them home requires **justification**. Push parents to explain why they should pass on their religion—apart from a principled urge to keep the faith—and they're likely to tell you **studies prove** that kids do better with religion than without it.

But is religion really good for kids? That might depend on what kind of child you want to raise.

... "The problem with certain religious beliefs," according to Bloom, "isn't that they are incredible (science is also incredible) and isn't that they ruin children's ability to distinguish between fantasy and reality. It's that they are false."

... The question of children and religion, then, is really just a small part of the broader dilemma of faith versus skepticism. In the United States, the **vast majority of us** choose the former and push our kids to do the same. That might make them docile, obliging, and credulous. But it doesn't make them better people.



More Harm than Good?: The Moral Maze of Complementary and Alternative Medicine

by Edzard Ernst, Kevin Smith

This book reveals the numerous ways in which moral, ethical and legal principles are being violated by those who provide, recommend or sell 'complementary and alternative medicine' (CAM). The book

analyses both academic literature and internet sources that promote CAM. Additionally the book presents a number of brief scenarios, both hypothetical and real-life, about individuals who use CAM or who fall prey to ethically dubious CAM practitioners. The events and conundrums described in these scenarios could happen to almost anyone. Professor emeritus of complementary medicine Edzard Ernst together with bioethicist Kevin Smith provide a thorough and authoritative ethical analysis of a range of CAM modalities, including acupuncture, chiropractic, herbalism, and homeopathy. This book could and should interest all medical professionals who have contact to complementary medicine and will be an invaluable reference for patients deliberating which course of treatment to adopt.

A Scientist in Wonderland: A Memoir of Searching for Truth and Finding Trouble

This is the story of the author's life as a doctor and a scientist. Despite a youthful ambition to become a jazz musician, he studied medicine and eventually became a medical research scientist, taking up appointments in Germany, Austria and finally in England. His reverence for the pursuit of truth through the application of scientific methods, coupled with a growing interest in the history of medicine during the Nazi era, did not always endear him to others. At the time he was appointed to the world's first chair in alternative medicine, this was an area of health care that had rarely been studied systematically, and was almost entirely dominated by outspokenly evangelic promoters and enthusiasts - among them, famously, HRH Prince Charles -

many of whom exhibited an overtly hostile, antiscientific attitude towards the objective study of their favoured therapies. Clashes were inevitable, but the sheer ferocity with which advocates of alternative medicine would operate in order to protect their field from scrutiny came as a profound surprise. This memoir provides a unique insight into the cutthroat politics of academic life and offers a sobering reflection on the damage already done by pseudoscience in health care.

Professor Ernst qualified as a physician in Germany where he also completed his MD and PhD theses. He was Professor in Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation (PMR) at Hannover Medical School (Germany) and Head of the PMR Department at the University of Vienna (Austria). He came to the University of Exeter in 1993 to establish the first Chair in Complementary Medicine. Since 2012, he is Emeritus Professor.

Secular Psychotherapy

As a lifelong atheist, religion was never a part of my practice. I always identified myself as a humanist who relies on research-supported methods tailored to meet individual needs.



Through my secular readings and affiliations with secular groups, it became more and more apparent that there are so many people that have difficulty finding therapists who do not have some religious biases. I also met many people who struggle with issues related to religious upbringing but keep coming across therapists who try to promote spirituality or prayer for healing.

I was particularly influenced by *Dr. Darrel Ray* who brought to light the need for accessibility to secular therapists. He created a database of mental health professionals who met rigorous evaluation and made it available through the *Secular Therapy Project*(*seculartherapyproject.com*). My own participation in this project has provided me with opportunities to work with people: all are unique, and have different types of issues.

I do often work with patients who are religious believers, but I make it clear from the onset that my approach is strictly reality-based and that I leave "spiritual" issues to their respective religious leaders. I believe that everyone can benefit from psychological strategies aimed at altering negative patterns of thinking, improving communication skills, overcoming difficulties in decision making, setting effective goals, proper time management and improving organization.

Although my profession's ethical guidelines do not permit me to use actual cases and examples, I am able to provide a glimpse of how *Secular Therapy* can help through example composites of patients that reflect the different kinds of situations I deal with:

"Mr. Z" was a 28 year old male who suffers from low self esteem, low confidence, and other social issues. He is smart, talented and skilled at his craft; however, he continually sabotages any opportunities for advancement. Furthermore, despite a strong desire for relationships he avoids social situations. History revealed that the foundation of his negative view of himself was laid by harsh parental rearing practices shaped by religious dogma. By helping this patient understand where his negative beliefs about himself come from, he was able to see how they influence his mood and decisions. Together, we worked on identifying and changing negative thought patterns and maladaptive behaviors.

"Ms. X" no longer shared her family's fundamentalist beliefs. She described her parents as loving but very devout. She was feeling guilty about living life as an atheist while simultaneously presenting herself as a religious believer to her family. She wanted an authentic life but was afraid of disappointing her parents and worse than that she feared rejection. Helping people "come out" is always challenging because there is no guaranty of a positive outcome. We worked on her internal conflicts and fears, her needs for authenticity vs. acceptance, communication and assertiveness, expectations, developing support systems and building of confidence.


20 years ago, Dr. Lane and her husband also founded a non-profit organization called Paws for Life, helping to provide financial assistance to pet owners facing veterinarian expenses in emergency situations. Her family has also volunteered support for rescue groups who rehabilitate and prepare animals for adoption.

UnitedCoR wants to thank Dr. Lane for writing to us about her work as a registered and trained psychotherapist, who focuses her work on peer-reviewed and scientifically-tested methods, rather than religious belief. Religion belonged to the infancy of the human race; it had been a necessary stage in the transition from childhood to maturity. It had promoted ethical values which were essential to society. Now that humanity had come of age, however, it should be left behind. ~ A History of God by Sigmund Freud





Why did religion first emerge and then continue to evolve in all human societies? The book remains true to its subtitle by emphasizing an array of both biological and sociocultural forms of *selection* dynamics that are fundamental to explaining religion as a universal institution in human societies. In addition to Darwinian selection, which can explain the biology and neurology of religion, the book outlines a set of four additional types of sociocultural natural selection that can fill out the explanation of why religion first emerged as an institutional system in human societies, and why it has continued to evolve over the last 300,000 years of societal evolution.

In this examination of religion's influence on society, an anthropologist critiques fundamentalism and all mindsets based on rigid cultural certainties. The author argues that the future can only be safeguarded by a global humanistic outlook that recognizes and respects differing cultural perspectives and endorses the use of critical reason and empiricism. Houk coins the term "culturalism" to describe dogmatic viewpoints governed by culture-specific values and preconceived notions. Culturalism gives rise not only to fundamentalism in religion but also stereotypes about race, gender, and sexual orientation.





In James Alcock's classic 1995 article "The Belief Engine", he said, "Our brains and nervous systems constitute a belief-generating machine, a system that evolved to assure not truth, logic, and reason, but survival." Now he has expanded that thesis into a book that is much more than a book about belief. In the Foreword, Ray Hyman says it would be an ideal textbook for a course that provides an integrated overview of all the areas of psychology. He says every psychologist and psychology student should read it. It is an outstanding achievement of scholarship; its 640 pages include over 70 pages of references. It covers everything from the latest findings in neuroscience to a catalog of many of the questionable beliefs people hold, and why they hold them.


