Epicurus, Lucretius, and Happinesss

As the annals of history have it, in the sixth century Emperor Justinian had all the schools of philosophy that competed with Christianity finally closed. This was the last we heard of the Epicurean School, whose tradition had remained culturally vibrant for seven centuries. Epicurus had been among the first to propose the atom—2,300 years ago—the social contract as a foundation for the rule of law, and the possibility of an empirical process of pursuit of happiness: a science of happiness. These progressive schools were oases of tranquility, reason and pleasure known as Gardens, where the ideals of civilized friendship flourished and men, women and even

slaves engaged in philosophical discourse as equals.

In his *Principal Doctrines 11-12*, Epicurus argued for the study of science as a way to emancipate ourselves from irrational fears. For naturalists who don't believe in gods or spirits, the first two negative statements may be translated as 'Do not fear chance or blind luck, for it is pointless to battle that which we have no control over. It generates unnecessary suffering'.

Roman Epicurean poet Lucretius, in his De Rerum Natura, dedicates long portions of the philosophical poem to explaining how natural phenomena such as lightning and the movements of heavenly bodies are not the work of the Gods and that fear of the Gods is inconsistent with civilized life. Since he was unable in those days to produce a fully scientific theory to explain all these phenomena, he provided several possible theories for many of them without officially endorsing one, and humbly acknowledged that future thinkers would prove the main points of his naturalist and scientific cosmology, which they eventually did. And so we can say that his basic attitude was a sound one, and also that he respected our intelligence enough to not exhibit arrogance and certainty where he did not have conclusive theories. He allowed time to prove him right ... and sincere.



The following quotes are from David W. Orr's 2016 book, *Dangerous Years: Climate Change, the Long Emergency, and the Way Forward.*

"If humanity is to have a better future it will be a more "empathic civilization," one better balanced between our most competitive, hard-driving selves and our most harmonious, altruistic traits; one that embraces the yinyang poles of behavior. It must be a change sufficiently global to bridge the chasms of ethnicity, gender, religion, nationality, and politics and deep enough to shift perceptions, behaviors, and values. The change must enable people to grow from a "having" orientation to a "being" orientation to the world. It must deepen our appreciation, affiliation, and competence with the natural world, albeit a natural world undergoing accelerating changes.

I do not think, however, that we can simply will ourselves to that empathic new world. The transition will result from social movements, activism, education, and political changes. But there is always an X-factor, an inexplicable process of metanoia, a word meaning "penitence; a reorientation of one's way of life; spiritual conversion." It is a change of inner sight. "I once was blind, but now I see" as the former slave trader John Newton wrote in the hymn "Amazing Grace." Metanoia is liberation from bondage—physical, mental, emotional—a total change of perspective."

"And there will be no *Deus ex machina*, or cavalry, or invisible hand, or miracle technological breakthrough that will rescue us in the nick of time. It will be up to us to change the odds and the outcomes on our own."

"Nearly everything on Earth behaves or works differently at higher temperatures. Ecologies collapse, forests burn, metals expand, concrete runways buckle, rivers dry up, cooling towers fail, and people curse, kill, and terrorize more easily. Climate deniers . . . are doomed to roughly the same status as, say, members of the Flat Earth Society. "

"We would be embarrassed to graduate students who could neither read nor count. We should be mortified, then, to graduate students who are ecologically illiterate—clueless about the basics of ecology,

energetics, systems dynamics—the bedrock conditions for civilization and human life."

"We need people who make charity and civility the norm. We need more parks, farmers' markets, bike trails, baseball teams, book groups, poetry readings, good coffee, conviviality, practical competence, and communities where the word "neighbor" is a verb, not a noun. We need people who know and love this place and see it whole and see it for what it can be. "

This gripping, deeply thoughtful book considers future of civilization in the light of what we know about climate change and related threats. David Orr, an award-winning, internationally recognized leader in the field of sustainability and environmental education, pulls no punches: even with the Paris Agreement of 2015, Earth systems will not reach a new equilibrium for centuries. Earth is becoming a different planet—more threadbare and less biologically diverse, with more acidic oceans and a hotter, more capricious climate. Furthermore, technology will not solve complex problems of sustainability.

Yet we are not fated to destroy the Earth, Orr insists. He imagines sustainability as a quest and a transition built upon robust and durable democratic and economic institutions, as well as changes in heart and mindset. The transition, he writes, is beginning from the bottom up in communities and neighborhoods. He lays out specific principles and priorities to guide us toward enduring harmony between human and natural systems.

"Significant loss of neurons is a normal part of ageing" and other brain cell myths

Basic facts about the brain are a key part of many introductory psychology courses, including information about brain cells. For instance, for years, students (and the public) have been taught that, thanks to the ageing process, the older we get, the more brain cells we lose. But as outlined in a new review in the Journal of Chemical *Neuroanatomy* by Christopher von Bartheld at the University of Nevada, many established facts about brain cells (like the idea we lose lots of them as we get older) have been shown by modern techniques to be misconceptions. 

FEMA Reverses Policy - Churches Now Eligible For Disaster Relief

They don't even pay taxes but churches will now receive taxpayer money after FEMA reverses a long established policy in order to fund the rebuilding of churches after natural disasters.

Earlier this week the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) announced that:

private nonprofit houses of worship are now eligible for disaster assistance as community centers, without regard to their secular or religious nature. These changes are effective for disasters declared on or after August 23, 2017 and for applications for assistance that were pending with FEMA as of August 23, 2017, including applications on first- or second-level appeal, that as of today have not yet been resolved by FEMA.

The policy change comes in response to two lawsuits brought by three Texas churches and two Florida synagogues after Hurricane Harvey. In a previous report, Reuters noted that the Texas churches were hoping that an earlier decision, Trinity Lutheran Church of Columbia Inc v. Comer, would help their case. In that decision the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that taxpayer-funded grants for playgrounds available to nonprofits under a state program could not be denied to a school run by a church.

However, that decision was about a playground, which the court ruled had a secular purpose. This new policy shift from FEMA ignores that significant distinction.

In her important and powerful dissent in the Trinity Lutheran Church of Columbia v. Comer case, Justice Sonia Sotomayor declared: "If this separation means anything, it means that the government cannot tax its citizens and turn that money over to houses of worship."

Sotomayor was correct. The reason churches were excluded from receiving taxpayer supported disaster relief funds is because of the separation of church and state as outlined in the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution which prohibits the state from funding or supporting any church.

The new policy from FEMA abandons the U.S. Constitution, and moves the nation closer to theocracy.

Commenting on the new announcement from FEMA, Larry T. Decker, Executive Director of the Secular Coalition for America, said: "A government that truly values religious freedom can never be in the business of building churches. Houses of worship already have access to funds that reimburse them for their sheltering and feeding operations during natural disasters. This new policy crosses a clear constitutional line by using federal dollars to repair and rebuild facilities primarily used for religious purposes. The principle of religious freedom, protected by the First Amendment, guarantees all Americans the right to decide for themselves what religious institutions, if any, they support with their money. Our hearts go out to all those impacted by natural disasters, but the wall of separation between church and state must endure through the best and worst of times."

FEMA's new policy extends far beyond the boundaries clearly stipulated in the Trinity Lutheran case. While we were deeply troubled by the Court's decision in that case, their ruling did specify that Trinity Lutheran was eligible to receive a public grant for its playground because it was an ostensibly secular part of the church. FEMA's new guidelines explicitly disregard this condition. It is, frankly, appalling but unsurprising to see the religious right exploiting natural disasters to justify using FEMA like an ATM.

Alison Gill, legal and policy director of American Atheists, said: "It is shameful that the Trump Administration would misapply federal law in order to justify giving disaster relief funding to religious organizations, rather than to people and communities. This is a jaw-dropping abrogation of the government's obligation to protect taxpayers from being forced to directly fund religious activities with their tax dollars. This illegal change in policy would, for the purpose of disaster relief, deem religious worship an essential government-type service.

"FEMA should focus on providing relief to the individuals and local governments affected by natural disasters, not giving special handouts to churches and houses of worship to perform religious activities. That is a blatantly unconstitutional violation of the First Amendment."

In response to the FEMA decision, Freedom From Religion Foundation issued the following action request:

"Please take action to let FEMA know that allowing churches to receive taxpayer dollars is an assault on the religious liberty of American citizens. Here's how you can help:





I am obviously a Humanist. My husband identifies as a Humanist too. We have been

married for 17 years now. Still happily married. What is the secret to our success. Respect and problem solving.

I truly respect my husband. He is a wonderful person. Creative, caring, compassionate, responsible, kind, intelligent, interesting and supportive. It is very easy to forget all that when we are problem solving though.

Marriage is a partnership. The two people work together to secure food and housing and health care and if they have kids, to help raise and take care of and support the individuals in their family unit – however that is defined and however extended that family unit is.

This is a long winded way of saying – marriages require a lot of problem solving. All the time. Sometimes, we have disagreements on how best to solve our problems. Sometimes those disagreements are minor – like what color to paint the walls. Other times they are more pressing, like who is going to take out the trash or make sure the kid is picked up from whatever activity they are at.

Respect for the other person as a fully functional intelligent human being, helps us navigate those disagreements so that we engage in cooperative problem solving and don't devolve into arguments. People are often astonished that my husband and I rarely argue. It happens every once in a while. But mostly, we just enter problem solving mode and respect each other's ideas and suggestions. I guess that's what comes with being married for 17+ years.



Essential works



Before he began his recent travels, it seemed to Phil Zuckerman as if humans all over the globe were "getting religion"—praising deities, performing holy rites, and soberly defending the world from sin. But most residents of Denmark and Sweden, he found, don't worship any god at all, don't pray, and don't give much credence to religious dogma of any kind. Instead of being bastions of sin and corruption, however, as the Christian Right has suggested a godless society would be, these countries are filled with residents who score at the very top of the "happiness index" and enjoy their healthy societies, which boast some of the lowest rates of violent crime in the world (along with some of the lowest levels of corruption), excellent educational systems, strong economies, well-supported arts, free health care, egalitarian social policies, outstanding bike paths, and great beer.

Zuckerman formally interviewed nearly 150 Danes and Swedes of all ages and educational backgrounds over the course of fourteen months. He was particularly interested in the worldviews of people who live their lives without religious orientation. How do they think about and cope with death? Are they worried about an afterlife? What he found is that nearly all of his interviewees live their lives without much fear of the Grim Reaper or worries about the hereafter. This led him to wonder how and why it is that certain societies are non-religious in a world that seems to be marked by increasing religiosity. Drawing on prominent sociological theories and his own extensive research, Zuckerman ventures some interesting answers.

This fascinating approach directly counters the claims of outspoken, conservative American Christians who argue that a society without God would be hell on earth. It is crucial, Zuckerman believes, for Americans to know that "society without God is not only possible, but it can be quite civil and pleasant."





On Monday, December 4, 2017, I hosted a showing of the documentary Contradiction, by Black atheist Jeremiah Camara. I appeared in the 2014 documentary that deals with theism – primarily Christianity – in the Black community.

The film was very well-received and there was a lively discussion that followed. Most of those in attendance were theists and two Afrocentric individuals had some defenses of theism. One man, a local college instructor, made several comments. He did not like the title of the film. He pointed out that rather than a contradiction, Black religion is a paradox.

That is to say, it might appear to be contradictory, but deeper thought reveals its conflicting truths. I disagree. Religion in general and "holy" books in particular are filled with contradictions.

Moreover, the main contradiction that the documentary sought to highlight was the large number of Black churches (estimated at 85,0000) in the U.S. with the widespread poverty, suffering, ill health, etc. found among African Americans. If we spend so much time, money and prayer on spirituality, why are we at the bottom where the major quality of life indicators are concerned? That is a blatant contradiction.

Finding an on-site service project on a small budget can be a challenge. Here's a meaningful solution and a resource site with everything you need to host this project at your next event, conference, or meeting! The *Positive Postcard Project* shares messages of human connection and love that can inspire, comfort, or uplift a recipient of any faith or non-faith perspective.

This is important. Many support card and note projects come from churches and other organizations that are biased towards theism and proselytizing. These cards often contain language that not only isn't meaningful or relevant to non-theistic people, but can further victimize or even isolate them, thereby increasing their burden, and causing unnecessary grief and anxiety during their times of need.

People who identify as non-theistic are all around us, and they, too, are among those in need. They deserve resources, support, representation, comfort, care, and love. Positive Postcards engages secular communities and our secular-friendly allies by providing that support and encouragement. The project can also be hosted at public events, educating theistic faith communities about respecting the diverse perspectives of those who receive cards or letters such as these.

A person's time of turmoil, challenge, or disadvantage should not be an opportunity to market religious belief or no preference. We don't know the perspective of the person receiving the card and therefore should <u>craft messages that speak to any recipient</u>—unapologetically inclusive and loving. As non-theists, we're empowered and emotionally intelligent to ensure that members of our shared values community are respected and supported. As Humanists, we have a responsibility to seek the means to uplift others and make the world a better place.
