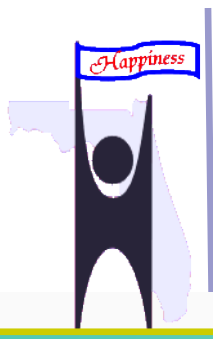

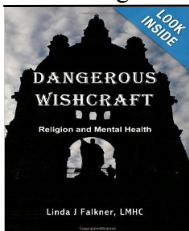


Florida County Judge pushes Religion in Court! In Tallahassee.

Judith Hawkins, who served as a county judge in Tallahassee, Florida, evidently used her government position to advance her religious ministry and lost office after being found guilty. Hawkins founded the company Gaza Road Ministries and ran it from inside the Leon County Courthouse apart from selling her ministry's books to legal practitioners who appeared before her.

According to James Ruth, Judicial Qualifications Commission Hearing Panel Chair, Hawkins was found guilty of obliterating subpoenaed financial records, misleading investigators during depositions and not handing over material without official orders. She was also found guilty of publishing photos of herself wearing the judicial robe on her ministry's website, not complying with tax laws, using less than her full time for judicial duties and reading tabloids during court proceedings.

These allegations against Hawkins first surfaced in December 2012 and the case has been continuing ever since. However, on July 1st, the Florida Supreme Court ruled that Hawkins could no longer serve as a judge. While the Judicial Qualifications Commission said that she should be fined \$17,000 and suspended for 90 days, the Supreme Court can decide on a much harsher punishment unless Hawkins provides them with a good reason to reconsider before August 14. 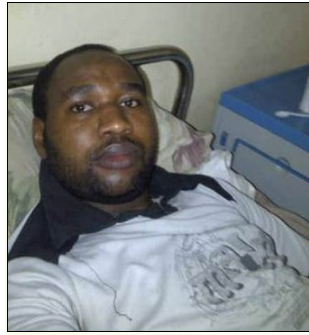

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**Nigerian
Atheist
Committed**

According to the Lagos *Independent*:

A Nigerian man has been committed to a mental institute in Kano state despite being given a clean bill of health because he declared he did not believe in God, a humanist charity has said.

Mubarak Bala is being held against his will and forcibly medicated at the Aminu Kano Teaching Hospital, where he has been kept since 13 June, the International Humanist and Ethical Union (IHEU) reports.

The chemical engineering graduate is allegedly being held on the grounds of a "personality change" because he declared himself an atheist despite being raised in a Muslim family in Kano, which is a mainly Muslim state.

The organization says that when Mr Bala told his family he did not believe in God, they took him to a doctor and asked if he was mentally ill.

When this doctor found him to be fit and well, the family are then believed to have taken him to a second doctor who claimed he was suffering with a personality disorder.

Civil liberties news in the Sunshine State



Last week, Attorney General Eric Holder spoke out against lifetime felon disfranchisement, a voting rights crisis of which Florida is the worst offender. This March, the a U.N. panel is going to review the U.S.'s compliance with the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR), a treaty that requires nations hold up to certain human rights standards. One of the areas which the UN panel will be scrutinizing is voting rights for people with past felony convictions, an area where Florida has disfranchised over 1.5 million citizens.

Florida's lifetime disfranchisement of people with past felony convictions has long been a black eye on our record for democracy and it was made worse when Gov. Scott and the Board of Executive Clemency created new rights restoration restrictions. Now that record is under the microscope for international scrutiny, and the Attorney General has called for reforms.

For several years now, various leaders of the Freethought community in the bay area have been meeting informally to share experiences, and occasionally to coordinate plans. But recently, changing circumstances have brought additional pressure to cooperate in bringing programs and members services to an expanding movement.

At this point leaders continue to meet, and together with the various boards of directors and committees, try to develop policies that will enable every group to enhance its unique role in serving its members.

There appears to be general agreement on developing several community wide programs over the year that will allow significant speakers to be presented in our area. The costs of these programs will be shared among the organizations proportionally.

Thus substantive and exciting new activities will be offered to the Tampa Bay area that were not possible for most organizations before.

We are especially grateful to the national office of the United Coalition of Reason and its director, Fred Edwards. You may recall that UCoR was the major impetus to getting a large number of billboards erected in Tampa Bay and across the nation with such messages as "You can be good without God. Millions are!"

TBCoR is an alliance of groups identified with the freethought / Humanist /Atheist movement.

Our contemporary world is host to two coexisting but fundamentally different—and, in at least one crucial respect, contradictory—realities. One of these might be termed Political Reality, though it extends far beyond formal politics and pervades conventional economic thinking. It is the bounded universe of what is acceptable in public economic-social-political discourse. The other is Physical Reality: i.e., what exists in terms of energy and materials, and what is possible given the laws of thermodynamics.

For decades these two realities have developed along separate lines. They overlap from time to time: politicians and economists use data tied to measureable physical parameters, while physical scientists often frame their research and findings in socially meaningful ways. But in intent and effect, they diverge to an ever-greater extent.

The issue at which they differ to the point of outright contradiction is economic growth. And climate change forces the question.

...Within a contracting economy, income and wealth inequality becomes a critical political and social issue. Unless policies dictate otherwise, those with prior economic advantage tend to aggressively aggregate an ever-larger share of overall societal wealth and income, while those at the bottom of the heap descend into absolute misery. Solutions would begin with taxing financial transactions, inherited wealth, high incomes, and luxury goods, with the revenues spent on building renewable energy infrastructure, redesigning food and transport systems to dramatically reduce oil dependence, and helping poor folks adapt and get by. These policies must be promoted on a national and global scale with major funding and the enlisted expertise of messaging professionals.

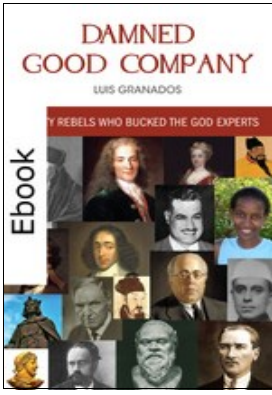
Now for those objections—"It's too late," "We haven't the capacity." They are persuasive. The fulfillment of the above wish list (it could be lengthened considerably) is indeed a far longshot. But even minor progress along any of these lines could help change the trajectory of collapse and our chances for a desirable outcome.

If the problem of political realists is self-delusion, the predicament of many physical realists is a sense of defeat and dread. So for the sake of the latter I will conclude with a little pep talk (directed as much to myself as to readers). Too much is at stake to retire in cynical self-assurance that we are right, they are wrong; we are weak, they are strong. Yes, horrible consequences from past growth are inevitable; today's physical reality is a given. However, tomorrow's reality is still, at least to some degree*, up to us. Jennifer Hancock started this organization several years ago. It uniquely serves Humanist families with a variety of wonderful programs throughout the year.

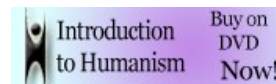

Overcoming Addictions

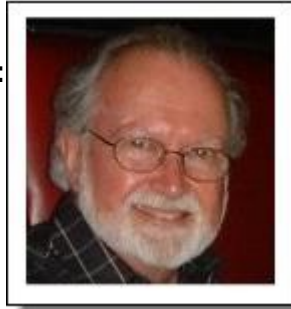

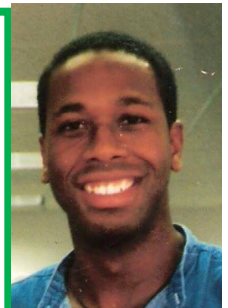

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On Humor and Its Not-So-Funny Consequences

Many people believe that humor is always harmless and could not possibly have any negative consequences. Whenever anyone disagrees with this simplistic view, they are dismissed as lacking a sense of humor, killjoys, etc.

However, anyone who has had just a single course in humor studies understands that there are different kinds of humor that appeal to different kinds of people. Some kinds of humor are rooted in meanness, cynicism and misanthropy. The worst kinds of humor are racist, sexist, and homophobic. Some of these jokes are not even funny, and seem to be indulged in primarily for shock value and generating feelings of discomfort. These include jokes about rape, sexual abuse, the Holocaust, etc.

Those that consider all forms of humor to be harmless – rather than merely tasteless – do not understand that humor has often been part of the arsenal that oppressors have used to intimidate people and to keep people down. Perhaps nowhere is this fact more clear than in the history of racist humor directed against Black people.

In the 1980s, director and producer Marlon Riggs came out with the Emmy Award-winning film *Ethnic Notions*. The film was narrated by Esther Rolle, best known as the character Florida Evans, the mother on the 1970s classic sitcom “*Good Times*.” The film, in part, showed how, from the Civil War through the civil rights movement, White media and popular culture used humor to perpetuate stereotypes and caricatures of Black people through books, poetry, cartoons, film, advertisements, children’s stories, comedic routines with Whites and Blacks in blackface, etc. This onslaught fostered not only White supremacy but Black self-hatred. Blacks were depicted as lazy, stupid, ugly, highly sexed, etc. During minstrel shows, the stereotype of the happy, singing, dancing, laughing Black slave was popularized. These images no doubt influenced laws and public policy throughout the U.S.

There has also been racist humor focusing upon Jews, Chinese, Japanese, and other groups. Shortly after the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001, many Black stand-up comedians made bigoted jokes about the idea that all Arabs and Muslims are terrorists.

Cruel, hurtful jokes about Gay men have long been popular throughout the world. Many comedians foster the stereotype that all Gay men are effeminate. Some comedians are completely over the top. For example, not long ago, Tracy Morgan joked that he would stab his son if he found out that he was Gay. (He later apologized for the joke.) Sexist jokes often make women feel uncomfortable and afraid. Such jokes often create or exacerbate a hostile work environment for women. Some men not only tell sexist jokes, but wear t-shirts or display posters or artwork with sexist jokes.

Many times, members of historically oppressed groups are driven by self-hatred and greed to stereotype their own people in the name of humor. For example, many Black stand-up comedians make fun of or denigrate dark-skinned Black people with thick lips and other pronounced African features. They will make jokes about alleged Black incompetence, undependability and other stereotypes.

This is not to say that racial or sexual humor do not have their place. One can make fun of very real differences among the races without being cruel or without promoting stereotypes. There are clear differences in cultures, interests, musical tastes, food preferences, sports preferences, etc. among different races. Such differences can be recognized and joked about without resorting to thinly disguised racial attacks. Similarly, sex is a natural part of life and can be joked about without using humor as a weapon to objectify women or make them feel uncomfortable, especially if such humor is presented under the right circumstances and at appropriate places and times.

What makes it difficult to fight against harmful kinds of humor is the fact that, whenever such humor presents itself, some insufferable, bigoted loudmouth will inevitably appear to whine about alleged political correctness, or PC. Indeed, the perfect preemptive strike against those that respect “the Other” is wrapped in an attack on this alleged threat. Tired complaints about alleged “PC run amok” have become de rigueur among bigots everywhere over the past few decades.

However, despite the damage that humor can do, censorship is not the answer. People must always have the right to express themselves. Still, as someone once noted, “just because you have the right to do it, doesn’t mean it’s right to do it.” Bigots need to do away with the idea that freedom to be bigoted means they have a corresponding right to be free from criticism, boycotts, or other legal and moral forms of retaliatory behavior. The victims of bigoted humor also have rights.

Contrary to what many people believe, just because a joke is funny or elicits much laughter does not necessarily make it o.k. The disturbing paradox is that humor often has very serious – even-tragic - consequences, and is often part of the way oppressors keep people down.



At the [Center for Inquiry](#), we believe that evidence-based reasoning, in which humans work together to address common concerns, is critical for modern world civilization. Moreover, unlike many other institutions, we maintain that scientific methods and reasoning should be utilized in examining the claims of both pseudoscience and religion. We reject mysticism and blind faith. No topic should be placed off limits to scrutiny—certainly not fringe science and religion, which have an enormous influence on beliefs and conduct.

We also maintain that values are properly the subject of study and discussion as much as empirical claims. The Center for Inquiry studies and promotes human values based on a naturalistic outlook. Ideological doctrine and religious dogma have no more right to dictate our moral norms than they do to influence scientific research.

Americans are dangerously ignorant on politics

The health of a democracy is dependent on an educated citizenry. Political illiteracy is the manure for the flourishing of political appeals based on sheer ignorance. The First Amendment's declaration that "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion" embodied the founders' view that religion has no place in the political domain.

That not a single major media outlet bother[s] to correct [citizens'] ignorance represents America's continual decline in American civic and cultural literacy.

"Every shortcoming of American governance is related in some fashion to the knowledge deficit of the public – if only because there is no widespread indignation at policies shaped by elected officials who suffer from the same intellectual blind spots as their constituents," observed Susan Jacoby, author of *The Age of American Unreason*.

The nation's collective ignorance as it pertains to cultural and civic literacy paves the way for extremist politicians to convince the public of the validity of extreme positions.

So how bad is America's political literacy?

A 2007 National Constitution Center poll found that two-thirds of Americans couldn't name all three branches of the U.S. federal government, nor a single Supreme Court justice. Another poll found that 91 percent couldn't name the current Chief Justice, which is staggering considering the number of high profile, politically polarizing cases deliberated upon by the nation's highest court in recent years – including the rulings on the Affordable Care Act, same-sex marriage and campaign finance laws.

It gets worse. When respondents were asked whether they could recall any of the rights guaranteed by the First Amendment, a majority could name only free speech. More than a third were unable to list any First Amendment rights. The National Constitution Center also found that 42 percent of Americans think the Constitution explicitly states that "the first language of the United States is English;" and 25 percent believe Christianity was established in the Constitution as the official government religion.

Only 40 percent of adults know that there are 100 Senators in the U.S. Congress, while a great majority of Americans have no idea of when or by whom the Constitution was written. A 2010 Pew Research Center [survey](#) of American's knowledge of public affairs and politics revealed that political literacy has been in rapid and continual descent since high water mark of the 1950s. While one may be forgiven for not understanding all the quirky procedural rules of the U.S. Senate, one should be suitably embarrassed if one cannot at least correctly identify the number of votes needed to end a filibuster, but on that – more than two-thirds of Americans do not know the answer is 60.

This rising tide of ignorance threatens the very foundation of American democracy.
