A Brief Candle in the Dark Sparks a Warm Glow

The book tour presentation of famed biologist, Richard Dawkins and his friend, mathematician, Herb Silverman has ignited the freethought community with renewed interest in the interface of science and its approach to reality and the problems of our evolving human culture. In particular, the ever present question of the lingering influence of religious opinion on public policy, especially educational policy. The discussion touched upon many area's of Dawkins life; from the

personal to the profound insights into the genetic process that is deeply implicated in all facets of our existence. The book they discussed is Dawkins' memoir of his life as a scientist and writer, A Brief Candle in the Dark.. But in addition to illuminating the scientific matters that are Dawkins' central concern, it becomes quickly evident that he is a participant in the very heart of the intellectual life of our time, and deeply involved in some of its most poignant controversies. His success as a writer enabled him to found the Dawkins Foundation which continues to take a leading role in the great roiling debates over such topics as evolution, atheism, and the enormous environmental challenges that shape our time. Many local groups continue to carry on with these issues.

Florida is one of top three Human Trafficking Destinations in U.S.

Human trafficking is the no. 2 illegal business in the world, second only to drug trafficking. 1.2 Million people globally become victims of human trafficking every year, according to estimates provided by the United Nations children's fund (unicef). Most of the victims are women and children used for cheap labor and sexual services by organized multinational criminal groups, according to a European commission report.

Human Trafficking is modern day slavery. Criminalized under both federal and Florida law, it is defined as the transporting, soliciting, recruiting, harboring, providing, or obtaining of another person for transport; for the purposes of forced labor; domestic servitude or sexual exploitation using force, fraud and/or coercion. If the sex trafficking victim is under the age of 18, it is human trafficking regardless of whether force, fraud and/or coercion exist.



Difficult Prognostications

We do have a way to "see it coming," whether it's environmental tipping points or financial ones. It's science. The whole point of science is to penetrate the fog of human senses, including common sense. Ingenious experiments and elegant equations act as extensions of senses that allow us to see farther and more precisely—beyond the horizons of what we think we know. Calculations predict possible futures, find clear signals in the almost constant noise.

Science predicted that massive stars would implode, nuclear bombs would explode, and humans could well destroy their own habitat (if they didn't begin to take seriously problems like overpopulation and resource depletion).

Sometimes science requires us to accept the unacceptable, certainly the unpalatable: What? Drive smaller cars? Give up my lawn? Be satisfied with a small house?

It's not always fun to see what's coming, especially when easy solutions are nowhere in sight. It takes courage to admit we've been clueless.

Then again, we really have no choice. Bartlett called people who refused to accept they lived in a closed off Coke-bottle-like world the "flat earth society"—because on a flat earth, space could be infinite. There'd be endless amounts of land for farming or garbage dumps, endless supplies of water and fuel, no limit to the amount of toxins we could pump into an infinite atmosphere.

Alas, we live on a sphere. Eratosthenes figured this out thousands of years ago, and no one liked it much then either. But he certainly saw it coming.







Humanist Families of Greater Tampa



CFI's Camp Inquiry Closes But its Impact remains

It is with genuine sadness that we are announcing that the Center for Inquiry is discontinuing <u>Camp Inquiry</u>, our annual weeklong program of education, investigation, and adventure for kids. The camp has been held each summer since 2006 in Holland, New York.

For organizations of all kinds, deciding how to allocate resources to various projects and programs can be extremely difficult. This is especially true for CFI, which maintains a variety of different programs, including publications, local branches, campus outreach, support for humanist affiliates in other countries, public policy advocacy, and litigation relating to our mission. Various factors had a role in the CFI board's decision to end our camp program. One relevant factor was the fact that the camp operated at a deficit most years. Another factor was the need to focus available resources on those programs more central to CFI's mission.

We recognize that many of our supporters may take issue with CFI's decision. We're not especially happy about the decision either. Camp Inquiry provided a uniquely rewarding learning and social experience for many children, and it has been a central point of pride for all of us at CFI.

However, as critical thinkers we also understand the importance of fiscal responsibility and the need to be careful stewards of our supporters' donations. Even though Camp Inquiry is coming to an end, we are confident it will have a lasting impact on the lives of former campers: kids who can share with their friends and family a love of science, curiosity about our world, and an appreciation for reason and critical thinking.

Thank you for your support of Camp Inquiry. If your children have been campers with us, you have our deepest gratitude for allowing us the privilege to get to know them, and to be inspired by them.

One final note: although Camp Inquiry did offer a unique experience, <u>Camp Quest</u> does provide programming for those interested in a secular camp environment. Desired Characteristics of a Scientific Theory

There is a very nice discussion of "The Nature of Theory in the Physical Sciences" by Julian Ripley, Jr. in his book *Elements and* Structure of the Physical Sciences. Statements one through ten constitute a summary of Ripley's main ideas.

- (1) Every law of science and presumably every theory must be in accord with the facts.
- (2) The theoretical or logical relationships involved must be *free from any inconsistency*; especially every theory must be free from self-contradiction.
- (3) Between two competing theories, both of which are validated by the facts, the *more general* theory is preferred.
- (4) Sometimes *simplicity* is the basis for preferring one theory to another. "Simplicity" however is hard to define and is to some extent an aesthetic quality.
- (5) No theory should introduce ad hoc assumptions (assumptions brought in arbitrarily just to make the theory fit the facts or to make it satisfy a preconceived purpose).
- (6) In addition to explaining facts presently known, a good theory enables us to make predictions about phenomena not presently observed.
- (7) It is highly desirable that a theory be expressed in quantitative terms; then the theory can be more rigorously tested—to see if it predicts not only what will happen but to what extent.
- (8) A theory should be vulnerable; that is, it should have specifically stated consequences that can be tested. If a theory is untestable, it is not a scientific theory.
- (9) It is advantageous (though not necessary) that a theory can be visualized in terms of some model that is familiar to common sense.
- (10) Scientists (and mathematicians) prefer theories that have aesthetic quality, which they sometimes describe as "elegance".

All of the above characteristics are important, but number five is particularly worthy of further discussion. It is frequently referred to as Ockham's razor. As originally advocated by William of Ockham, it read "Entities are not to be multiplied without necessity." A more clear and explicit statement of this principal was given by Isaac Newton: "We are to admit no more causes of natural things than such as are both true and sufficient to explain their appearances."

Two of the main differences between true science and pseudoscience are: (1) pseudoscientists do not appreciate the principle of Ockham's razor: they are willing to advocate unnecessary hypotheses in order to promote a preconceived purpose (as in their argument for "intelligent design"); and (2) when pseudoscientists develop a hypothesis they like, they don't test it properly—they just look for supporting evidence and ignore evidence to the contrary (as is the case with astrology). **Dr. Jack Robinson** is Emeritus Professor of Astronomy, USF. and a member of the Humanist Society of the Suncoast.

Rules Are for Schmucks: Religion and Child Marriage

A <u>New York Times</u> op-ed piece recently shined some light into the one of the darkest corners of our society: the practice of forcing children into marriage. <u>United Nations</u> data indicate that some 37,000 girls under eighteen get married *every day* somewhere around the world. But if you think that child marriage is only an issue in backwards lands, far away, you are mistaken. According to a <u>report</u> of the Centers for Disease Control, four percent of American women and one percent of men who married in the 2006-2010 period were under age eighteen. If you want depressing statistics on all the scarring for life this causes, there are plenty to be found in the National Institutes of Health reports with titles like <u>Child Marriage in the United States and Its Association With Mental Health in Women</u>.

What the *Times* article carefully avoids doing is blaming religion for any of this. Perhaps the author doesn't want to be branded as a religion baiter or (worse yet) Islamophobic. Since I don't care about that, let me fill in what she skipped.

Islam is the biggest, though not the only, driving force behind child marriage. The <u>Qur'an</u>, which is supposed to be the word of God, explicitly permits marriage shortly after the onset of menstruation. The current <u>Grand Mufti</u> of Saudi Arabia, the closest thing modern Islam has to a pope, is equally clear: "It is incorrect to say that it's not permitted to marry off girls who are fifteen and younger. A girl aged ten or twelve can be married. Those who think she's too young are wrong and they are being unfair to her."

When you look at the <u>list of countries</u> where marriage under age eighteen is most common, you find at the top countries that are heavily Islamic, like Niger, Chad, Guinea, and Bangladesh. Thousands of <u>Saudi Arabian</u> girls have been married off before their thirteenth birthdays to men at least twenty-five years older. In heavily Muslim northern <u>Nigeria</u>, where nearly half of all girls are married by age fifteen, the rise of <u>Boko Haram</u> has made the pressure for child marriage even more intense. Even in relatively westernized <u>Turkey</u>, thirty-nine percent of all married women in one province studied were under seventeen on their wedding day.

Islam may be the biggest religious source of child marriage, but not the only one. Jewish <u>halakhah</u> sets the minimum age for marriage at thirteen for boys and twelve for girls. A 2013 article in the <u>Jerusalem Post</u> points out that "Each year 4,500 children below the age of eighteen marry in Israel, two thirds Muslim, one third Jewish." To its credit, the Israeli Knesset recently changed the law to set an eighteen-year-old minimum marriage age, but allowing exceptions with judicial approval. Who opposed this change? The ultra-Orthodox God experts, making the same tiresome religious privilege arguments we get in America on everything from contraceptives in healthcare plans to county clerks needing to do their jobs. Who will be besieging the Israeli courts with demands for exceptions? You only get one guess. Conservative Christians also push their children into marriage, in order to prevent them from engaging in "sexual immorality." Catholic canon law permits marriage at sixteen for boys, and fourteen for girls. Not all underage marriages are forced by adults. Not all of them are related to religion. Some of them simply involve teenagers, sometimes referred to as "idiots," who are certain they've met the perfect life-mate. If they truly have, then waiting to marry until eighteen won't hurt them. But if they haven't, then taking an action intended to be permanent most definitely will. Whether an under-age marriage is coerced by religious parents or sought by hormone-crazed teenagers, it's a bad idea.

The law draws arbitrary lines all the time: speed limits, tax rates, building codes, etc. We can all agree that a one-year-old should not be able to marry or make other binding decisions; a thirty-year-old should be able to do so. Reasonable people can quibble about whether eighteen is the best possible place to draw the line for marriage, as the vast majority of <u>countries</u> do, but it isn't terrible. Eighteen is also used for other purposes, like voting, and entering into binding contracts. So a seventeen-year-old isn't thought competent to choose between Tweedledum and Tweedledee in the voting booth, whether or not his or her parents consent, but in most places can get married with their consent. A seventeen-year old cannot enter into a permanently <u>binding contract</u> to buy a motorcycle, with or without parental consent, but can enter into a "forever" marriage.

The minimum marriage age in most American states is eighteen, but every state allows exceptions, with the most common being "parental consent." But as the *Times* article points out, "one person's 'parental consent' can be another's 'parental coercion,' but state laws typically do not call for anyone to investigate whether a child is marrying willingly." A 2011 survey by the <u>Tahirih Justice Center</u> found 3,000 known or suspected cases in the previous two years alone of girls in the US as young as fifteen who were forced to marry under threats of death, beatings or ostracism. The whole notion of parental consent to marriage treats children as though they are objects belonging to their parents, to be disposed of as the parents wish.

Another common exception is for underage marriage with "judicial approval." How well does this work? A study in New Jersey found cases of judges approving the marriage of a ten-year-old boy to an eighteen-year-old woman, and of a twelve-year-old girl to a twenty-five-year-old man. In New York State, in 2011 alone, a fourteen-year-old married a twenty-six-year-old, a fifteen-year-old was wed to a twenty-eight-year-old, another fifteen-year-old was wed to a twenty-five-year-old, and a fifteen-year-old married someone age "thirty-five to thirty-nine." All of those marriages were approved by New York judges. A track record like that indicates that their power to make exceptions ought to be taken away. Judges, far too often, are politicians all too willing to cave in to religious pressure. The situation cries out for a simple rule, with no exceptions, ever.

During the long national debate on same-sex marriage, opponents kept arguing that allowing same-sex marriage demeans and weakens the institution of marriage itself, thereby harming traditional opposite-sex marriage as well. I never bought that. I do believe, though, that permitting underage marriage has exactly this effect. Marriage ought to be strictly viewable as two people making a careful choice to be with one another forever. Not a parent, not a judge, not a God expert. Just the two people who are going to be most affected by the decision, making it themselves, when they are capable of doing so, utterly free from any coercion. Anything less than that cheapens the institution that truly does form the bedrock of society.

Finally, one pitfall that US opponents of child marriage need to watch out for is RFRA, the "Religious Freedom Restoration Act" in effect in twenty-one states and the District of Columbia. Suppose they fight the good fight and win, getting a legislature to enact a no-exceptions minimum marriage age of eighteen. If that happens to be a RFRA state, it would be quite easy for a parent to show up in court claiming that "My religion says my daughter can marry at sixteen, and she and I want her to do exactly that. It would be a substantial burden on our exercise of our religious beliefs to stop her, so you have to make an exception for us." I think there is an excellent chance the parent wins that case, unless the bill drafters take care to specify that the minimum marriage age overrides the state RFRA.
