

Paris is over. Now it's back to the hard work of fighting for, and implementing, the energy transition.

We all know that the transition away from fossil fuels is key to maintaining a livable planet. Several organizations have formulated proposals for transitioning to 100 percent renewable energy; some of those proposals focus on the national level, some the state level, while a few look at the global challenge. David Fridley (staff scientist of the energy analysis program at Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory) and I have been working for the past few months to analyze and assess many of those proposals, and to dig deeper into energy transition issues— particularly how our use of energy will need to adapt in a ~100 percent renewable future. We have a book in the works, titled *Our Renewable Future*, that examines the adjustments society will have to make in the transition to new energy sources. We started this project with some general understanding of the likely constraints and opportunities in this transition; nevertheless, researching and writing *Our Renewable Future* has been a journey of discovery. Along the way, we identified not only technical issues requiring more attention, but also important implications for advocacy and policy. What follows is a short summary—tailored mostly to the United States—of what we've learned, along with some recommendations. We really need a plan; no, lots of them. Germany has arguably accomplished more toward the transition than any other nation largely because it has a plan—the Energiewende. This plan targets a 60 percent reduction in all fossil fuel use (not just in the electricity sector) by 2050, achieving a 50 percent cut in overall energy use through efficiency in power generation (fossil fueled power plants entail huge losses), buildings, and transport. It's not a perfect plan, in that it really should aim higher than 60 percent. But it's better than nothing, and the effort is off to a good start. Although the United States has a stated goal of generating 20 percent of its electricity from renewable sources by 2030, it does not have an equivalent official plan. Without it, we are at a significant disadvantage. What would a plan do? It would identify the low-hanging fruit, show how resources need to be allocated, and identify needed policies. We would of course need to revise the plan frequently as we gained practical experience (as Germany is doing). Finish online at: www.postcarbon.org

Clearwater, Florida



Earlier this year, the state legislature succeeded in passing a 24-hour waiting period for women seeking an abortion. On behalf of our clients Gainesville Woman Care and Medical Students for Choice, we immediately filed suit that has prevented the implementation of this harmful law. But another legislative session is about to begin, and the attacks on women's access to healthcare have already started.

Two bills, HB 233 and HB 1/SB 602, are now aimed at shutting down abortion providers by imposing medically unnecessary regulations on doctors and facilities that no other medical facility would be required to have.

Stop these medically unnecessary bills: urge your state legislators to reject HB 233 and HB 1/SB 602.


Not only are these bills unconstitutional, but these bills are bad for women's health. The decision about whether to carry a pregnancy to term is a private medical decision. 




Questionable Legislation in Florida, 2016.

The republican dominated legislature has begun its annual work, and citizens must become vigilant as ever more intrusive violations of our personal rights are discussed and submitted for passage.

HB 43, SB 110

Churches or Religious Organizations: Provides that churches or religious organizations, related organizations, or certain individuals may not be required to solemnize any marriage or provide services, accommodations, facilities, goods, or privileges for related purposes if such action would violate sincerely held religious belief; prohibits certain legal actions, penalties, or governmental sanctions against such individuals or entities.

HB 45 & SB 120

Creating the "Florida Competitive Workforce Act"; revising provisions to include sexual orientation and gender identity or expression and the perception of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, handicap, or marital status as impermissible grounds for discrimination; providing an exception for constitutionally protected free exercise of religion, etc.

HB401

Protection of Religious Freedom: Provides immunity from liability for health care facility, health care provider, person, closely held organization, religious institution, business owned or operated by religious institution, or private child-placing agency that refuses to perform certain actions that would be contrary to religious or moral convictions or policies.

HB 899

Instructional Materials for K-12 Public Education: Requiring instructional materials to meet certain standards; requiring each district school board to adopt a process allowing a taxpayer to object to the use of specific instructional materials based on specified criteria; revising the requirement that the district school superintendent certify that all instructional materials used by the district for core courses meet certain standards, etc.





Richard Dawkins Foundation to Merge with Center For Inquiry; RDF President Robyn Blumner Named CEO

Back in March, the Center For Inquiry's CEO **Ron Lindsay** announced that [he'd be retiring](#) at the end of the year, voluntarily stepping down as head of one of the largest Humanist organizations in the world. There was no hint of who would take his place or what big changes would occur after he left.

But that's changing today. CFI [just announced](#) that it will be merging with the [Richard Dawkins Foundation for Reason & Science](#) at the end of the month. Current RDF President [Robyn Blumner](#) (below) will become CEO of the newly combined group, which will retain the CFI name. With a multi-million dollar budget and a staff of several dozen employees, that will make Blumner one of the most Powerful Women in the World of Organized Atheism.

To be fair, that's kind of like being the highest rated show on Fusion. It's worth celebrating, but most people outside the community won't care. (While women run a number of atheist organizations, only **Annie Laurie Gaylor**, Co-President of the [Freedom From Religion Foundation](#), has a budget and staff in the same stratosphere.)

Blumner was named the President of RDF [two years ago](#). Before that, she wrote for the *Tampa Bay Times* and led two state affiliates of the ACLU. My interactions with her over the past years have been incredibly positive.

It sounds like a win-win for both sides. CFI gets the Dawkins stamp-of-approval along with a way to tap into his large fan base and web presence for events, disaster relief efforts, and donor drives. The Dawkins Foundation gets the stability that comes with a greater budget, larger staff, and physical branches around the country, not to mention the opportunity to piggyback on top of a much larger organization in order to further its own agenda of teaching science and advancing secularism.

And who knows? If this works, maybe other groups will consider merging in the future, too. There's no shortage of niche groups in our movement — serving women, African-Americans, Ex-Muslims, etc. — that could benefit from the direct support of larger organizations.

(On a philosophical note, CFI has historically been known for its promotion of Secular Humanism while Dawkins is obviously Mr. Atheism. While that's a distinction without a difference for most people, I wonder if any CFI loyalists will be upset.) The merger should be finalized (on paper) by this spring.

The principle figures said the following in a press release: "I am absolutely delighted that I'm closing out my tenure at CFI by helping to bring about a merger between RDFRS and CFI," said Ronald Lindsay. "Both organizations share a vital common mission, and together we can accomplish much more. And, of course, **CFI looks forward to the benefit of close collaboration with Richard Dawkins, indisputably one of the preeminent public intellectuals of our time.**"

Robyn Blumner observed, "**Secularism is on the ascendency in the United States and beyond. Science has proven to be the engine of human progress. Bringing more resources and ambition to promoting these forces**

of reason is what this merger is about. I am thrilled to be tapped to lead this joint effort and expand on what Ron Lindsay has built."

"I am very pleased that my foundation is about to join forces with the Center for Inquiry," said Richard Dawkins. "CFI is the biggest player in the secular / non-religious / skeptical world, and I like to hope that RDFRS will have something to add to its already flourishing enterprise. In turn, among our projects which will benefit from a larger team of professionals are Openly Secular and the Teacher Institute for Evolutionary Science (TIES)."

Darwin Day resolution in the U. S. Senate

December 18th, 2015

[Senate Resolution 337](#), introduced in the United States Senate on December 17, 2015, would, if passed, express the Senate's support of designating February 12, 2016, as "Darwin Day," and its recognition of Charles Darwin "as a worthy symbol on which to celebrate the achievements of reason, science, and the advancement of human knowledge"



Introduced by **Senator Richard Blumenthal (D-Connecticut)**, S. Res. 337 is the second Darwin Day resolution ever to appear in the Senate. A string of similar bills have been introduced in the House of Representatives, the most recent of which — H. Res. 548 — was [introduced](#) by Representative Jim Himes (D-Connecticut) on December 3, 2015.

In a December 18, 2015, press release from the Secular Coalition of America, which worked with Blumenthal on the resolution, Kelly Damerow, the organization's interim executive director, [commented](#), "This resolution celebrates the intellectual bravery and scientific discovery that contribute to the well-being of all people."

Estate tax rate is fair

The letter writer thinks estate or inheritance taxes punish small business owners, farmers and others. As an estate planning attorney, I disagree. The profit that accrues to those in the upper economic stratosphere needs to be taxed. The next generation has little to nothing to do with the "hard work" of their parents. If the effective tax rate is 20 percent or even more, it is eminently fair that the succeeding generation pay that tax, through loans if necessary, so that they have some burden for the wealth they are inheriting.

To say that the succeeding generation has no responsibility for their inherited wealth is just unfair and violates a basic concept of our economic system: that we are a meritocracy where all deserve at least a simulacrum of an equal chance in society.

This tax is fair also because our system has provided many benefits to that hardworking couple who built a small business or a profitable farm. It's also just because the next generation of the wealthy usually receives lots of advantages from their parents during the parents' lifetimes. The estate tax is one of the fairest taxes of all, and the argument that it amounts to double taxation is a red herring.

Florida's provisions imposing flat bans on financial aid to religious institutions is now on shaky ground.

According to Lyle Denniston, the National Constitution Center's constitutional literacy adviser, the Supreme Court has agreed to decide "Does the First Amendment's guarantee of the 'free exercise of religion' actually require states to provide aid to religious institutions, if the aid has nothing to do with promoting religious beliefs or practices?"

The court has chosen the case of Trinity Lutheran Church of Columbia v. Pauley. Missouri has a program of turning used tires into rubber surfacing material for playgrounds. Trinity Lutheran church applied for a grant for this program to replace "pea gravel" in the playground it has for the daycare center for children it runs. The state turned down Trinity's application because of the Missouri constitution's prohibits the use of funds from the public treasury to aid any church, sect, or denomination or religion. Florida has a very similar prohibition in its constitution.

Combined with the Justices review to the latest challenge of the Affordable Care Act, in which religious non-profits institutions that do want any role in the provision of free contraceptive devices and counseling to women employees and students, it makes this term of the Supreme Court extremely important to the constitutional debate.

We live in the age of information, which means that we also live in the age of misinformation. Indeed, you have likely come across more bullshit so far this week than a normal person living 1,000 years ago would in their entire lifetime. If we were to add up every word in every scholarly piece of work published prior to the Enlightenment, this number would still pale in comparison with the number of words used to promulgate bullshit on the internet in the 21st century alone. If you find your head nodding, start shaking it. I'm bullshitting you.

How could I possibly know how much bullshit you have come across this week? What if you're reading this on a Sunday? Who is a 'normal' person living 1,000 years ago? And how could I know how much bullshit they had to deal with?

It was very easy to construct this bullshit. Once I set out

to impress rather than inform, a burden was lifted from my shoulders and placed onto yours. My opening statements could very well be true, but we have no way of knowing. Their truth or falsity were irrelevant to me, the bullshitter.

According to the philosopher Harry Frankfurt, emeritus professor at Princeton University, bullshit is something that is constructed absent of any concern for the truth. This is quite different from lying, which implies a deep concern for the truth (namely, its subversion). Bullshit is particularly pernicious since the bullshitter adopts an epistemic stance that allows for a great deal of agility. For the bullshitter, it doesn't really matter if he is right or wrong. What matters is that you're paying attention.

How might we go about investigating bullshit empirically? Let's take the famed alternative medicine advocate and spiritualist Deepak Chopra as an [example](#). Read these examples of his tweets:

Dear Friend Of ACLU,

We're publishing a report today that shows across Florida, Black people are stopped and issued seatbelt citations far out of proportion to the number of Black drivers in Florida. In 2014, Florida law enforcement officers stopped and ticketed Black Floridians for seatbelt violations nearly twice as often as the white population.

Since 2005, the Florida Safety Belt Law has required that every Florida law enforcement agency annually report the race and ethnicity of seatbelt citation recipients to the Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (FDHSMV) to help the public identify instances of racial profiling.

Our investigation found that not only are many police departments not complying with the reporting requirements, but the ones that do paint a picture of a state where a black driver is far more likely to be cited for the same minor infraction than a white driver. And as several recent high-profile cases have shown us (Walter Scott and Samuel Dubose, killed by police officers following traffic stops for minor infractions; Sandra Bland, who died in a jail cell in Texas), even routine stops for minor infractions can escalate to deadly situations — especially for Black drivers. specific counties saw even greater disparities. Black drivers were stopped and cited:


- * 3 times more often than white drivers by the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office in 20142.
- * 8 times more often than white drivers by the Orange County Sheriff's Office in 20141.
- * 9 times more often than white drivers by the Broward County Sheriff's Office in 2014

Florida legislators and law enforcement agencies need to study these findings and find ways to ensure that the law is being applied fairly to everyone, and not used as a tool to target some drivers based on race.

NOW is a multi-issue political organization. NOW's self-defined role has been to initiate change for the benefit of the greatest number of people, to affect the legal and institutional structures of the society in a way that systematically expands the choices and possibilities available to all women. In this way, NOW takes action to bring women, as a class, into the mainstream of society, rather than offering aid to individual women in achieving personal solutions or temporary relief from oppression.

It's here. A new epoch—the Anthropocene—has begun.

So says an international group of geoscientists, in a [paper published](#) in January in the journal *Science*. They point to waste disposal, fossil fuel combustion, increased fertilizer use, the testing and dropping of nuclear weapons, deforestation, and more as evidence that human activity has pushed the Earth into the new age that takes its name from the Greek *anthropos*, or human. Some [argue](#) the new era began in the 1950s, the decade that marks the beginning of the so-called "Great Acceleration," when human population and its consumption patterns suddenly speeded up, and nuclear weapons tests dispersed radioactive elements across the globe.

Formalizing the Anthropocene era—a designation that must come officially from a separate body known as the International Commission on Stratigraphy—they write, "expresses the extent to which humanity is driving rapid and widespread changes to the Earth system that will variously persist and potentially intensify into the future." The scientists are likely to present their findings to the Commission later this year. "What this paper does is to say the changes are as big as those that happened at the end of the last ice age," Colin Waters, principal geologist at the British Geological Survey and an author of the study, [told the Guardian](#). "This is a big deal."

As *Smithsonian* magazine [notes](#), "The new study is not the first to propose a formal establishment of an Anthropocene epoch—Simon Lewis and Mark Maslin of the University of College London [made a similar recommendation](#) last year—but it is one of the most comprehensive to date."

Among the tell-tale signs that the Anthropocene has started, according to reporting on the study:


- **Über-industrialization.** "More than half the earth's surface has been transformed into settlements and cities, agricultural land, mines, waste dumps, baseball diamonds, and beyond," [writes](#) journalist Eric Roston at *Bloomberg*. What's more, he adds, "Mineral mining moves three times more sediment every year than all the world's rivers."
- **Plastics everywhere.** "Even most mud samples taken from remote ocean beds now [contain plastic fragments](#)," academics Mark Williams and Jan A. Zalasiewicz [write](#) for *The Conversation*. "Buried in sediment, these materials may be preserved over geological timescales, forming [new rocks](#) and rapidly-evolving '[technofossils](#)' for our descendants to marvel at."
- **Biologic changes.** "We've pushed extinction rates of flora and fauna far above the long-term average," *The Guardian* reports. "The Earth is now on course for a sixth mass extinction which would see 75% of species extinct in the next few centuries if current trends continue."
- **Nuclear fallout.** "Our war efforts have left their mark on geology," [notes](#) *New Scientist*. "When the first nuclear weapon was detonated on 16 July 1945 in New Mexico, it deposited radionuclides—atoms with excess nuclear energy—across a wide area. Since 1952, more explosive thermonuclear weapons have been tested, leaving a global signature of isotopes such as carbon-14 and plutonium-239."
- **Greenhouse gas levels.** As *Common Dreams* has [reported extensively](#), and the geoscientists point out, atmospheric concentrations of greenhouse gases like carbon dioxide and methane are higher than they've ever been. "Depending on the trajectory of future anthropogenic forcing, these trends may reach or exceed the envelope of Quaternary interglacial conditions," the study authors write—in other words, conditions could become more extreme than in previous ice ages.

Still, as damning as this evidence is, observers have cautioned against a simplistic view of geologic shifts. "Anthropocene is...suspect because—to the extent that 'we' wish to name the new epoch after a force, it generically identifies that force as humanity as a whole, rather than the identifiable power structures most responsible for the geological Anthropocene traces," [wrote](#) Kieran Suckling, founding director of the Center for Biological Diversity, in 2015.

Indeed, Ian Angus, editor of the ecosocialist journal *Climate and Capitalism*, [argued](#) last year: "An ecosocialist analysis of the Great Acceleration will build on the decisive issues of class and power that are shaping the Anthropocene and will ultimately determine humanity's future."
