

When climate scientists talk about carbon, they usually do so in terms of parts per million. During the last ice age, when much of North America was covered in glaciers a mile thick, carbon-dioxide levels in the atmosphere were around a hundred and eighty parts per million. For the ten thousand years leading up to the industrial revolution, they hovered around two hundred and eighty parts per million. By 1992, when the Framework Convention was drafted, they had reached three hundred and fifty parts per million. As MOP followed COP, carbon-dioxide levels kept rising. This spring, they topped four hundred parts per million.

Owing to the CO2 that's been pumped into the air so far, average global temperatures have risen by about 0.85 degrees Celsius (1.5 degrees Fahrenheit). This relatively small increase has produced some very large effects: almost half of the permanent Arctic ice cap has melted away, millions of acres' worth of trees in the American West have died from warming-related pest infestations, and some of West Antarctica's major glaciers, containing tens of thousands of cubic miles of ice, have started to disintegrate. But the system has yet to reach a new equilibrium, so even if CO2 levels were to stop rising tomorrow the world would continue to warm, by about .5 degrees Celsius (.9 degrees Fahrenheit).

To hold warming to less than two degrees Celsius, the best estimates available suggest that total emissions will have to be kept under a trillion tons of carbon. The world has already consumed around two-thirds of this budget. If current trends continue, the last third will be used up within the next few decades.





Hazarding a guess as to how most readers of this newsletter will vote in November–with skeptical thinking, research, and civic duty–please allow me to recommend to you some objective resources that I use and trust.

- 1. Vote Smart Picture this: thousands of citizens (conservative and liberal alike) working together, spending endless hours researching the backgrounds and records of thousands of political candidates and elected officials to discover their voting records, campaign contributions, public statements, biographical data (including their work history) and evaluations of them generated by over 400 national and 1300 state special interest groups. Every election these volunteers test each candidate's willingness to provide citizens with their positions on the issues they will most likely face if elected through the Political Courage Test.
- 2. <u>PolitiFact</u> Find out which politicians and pundits are telling the truth, which ones are stretching it, and which ones are making statements we rate Pants on Fire.
- 3. FactCheck "a nonpartisan, nonprofit consumer advocate for voters that aims to reduce the level of deception in U.S. politics."
- 4. Vote 411 Vote 411 is a project by the league of women voters and aims to educate both men and women about the how and where to vote. You can find out information about registering to vote (deadline is typically a month before elections) and general voter information in every state. This is a good place to check out if you are new to voting and are looking for general guidance on the voting process and not the issues.
- 5. <u>VoteEasy</u> Make voting easier—To find your best match, simply click on the tab of each subject that you are interested in and answer the questions. Be sure to appropriately rank the importance of each issue to you. As you answer the questions, VoteEasy will cumulatively compare your answers to those of the various candidates and rank the candidates with the most similar positions closest to you, while those who differ the most appear furthest away. To see the exact positions of a particular candidate, simply click on their picture to pull up the candidate's profile and you can see what we have determined would likely be their answer to each question based on their past speeches, comments, and votes.

Online Tools for Skeptical Fact Checking

Changes to the media over the past few decades have brought many distressing trends. Social media tend to reward emotional manipulation over truth-telling. News outlets, even well respected ones, rush to publish rumors and poorly substantiated claims. The fragmentation of news into ideological islands and search engines' tendency to cater to our preferences have helped to polarize viewpoints. But while we're arguably awash in more misinformation than ever before, online media have also enabled tools and sources that help us evaluate dubious claims. I recently spoke at the Skeptic's Toolbox, the annual skeptical workshop in Eugene, OR, about the variety of fact-checking tools available. It was less a lecture than a conversation, as the participants provided many of their own suggestions. While we can't pretend to be comprehensive, our combined lists should provide a good starting point for your fact-checking needs.


What is "Fact Checking"?

There are a variety of ways to answer this question. One way to think of fact checking is in light of its role in forming and evaluating arguments. As skeptics, we spend a lot of time looking for logical fallacies. But it takes more than sound logic for a conclusion to be true: the premises of the argument must be true as well or the entire argument falls apart.

We can investigate the soundness of our premises by examining internal consistency, external plausibility, and source validity.

- ☐ Internal consistency: If you read a claim and there are points of disagreement within the claim, that's a sign of something wrong.
- ☐ External plausibility: We should check the story against what we already know, and we may also do more research to check it out further.
- ☐ Source validity: We must identify the source of the claim, verify the source's identity, and consider the source's motives.

"I think most believers are good people. Although religious doctrine is generally irrational, divisive, and irrelevant to human values, some religions have good teachings sprinkled in with the dogma, and many well-meaning believers, to their credit, concentrate on those teachings. Surveying the smorgasbord of belief systems, we notice that they occasionally talk about peace and love. Who would argue with that? Sermons and holy books may encourage charity, mercy, and compassion, even sometimes fairness.

These are wonderful ideas, but they are not unique to any religion. We might judge one religion to be better than another, but notice what we are doing. When we judge a religion, we are applying a standard outside of the religion. We are assuming a framework against which religious teachings and practices can be measured. That standard is the harm principle. If a teaching leans toward harm, we judge it as bad. If it leans away from harm, it is good, r at least better than the others. If a religious precept happens to be praiseworthy it is not because of the religion but in spite of it. Its moral worth is measured against real consequences, not orthodoxy or righteousness."

Humanist Group Continues Legal Battle Against Florida Police Department for Hosting Community Prayer Vigil

OCALA, Fla. — A prominent humanist group is seeking summary judgment in a lawsuit against a Florida police department for hosting and promoting a community prayer vigil in 2014, which it asserts is an unconstitutional government entanglement with religion.

The American Humanist Association (AHA) had sued the Ocala Police Department in November 2014 two months after it held the vigil, which was meant to combat a wave of crime in the city.

"We are facing a crisis in the City of Ocala and Marion County that requires fervent prayer to show unity and help in this senseless crime spree that is affecting our community," read a letter posted to the Department website and social media pages, and signed by Police Chief Greg Graham.

"I am urging you all to please support the very important 'Community Prayer Vigil' ... to be held in our Downtown Square located in the heart of the city," it said.

AHA then contacted Graham to demand the removal of the letter, but he refused. Mayor Kent Guinn stood by Graham.

"There is nothing in the Constitution to prohibit us from having this vigil," he allegedly wrote in response to one complaint. "Not only are we not canceling it, we are trying to promote it and have as many people as possible to join us."

Therefore, the prayer gathering went forward, which generated several hundred attendees. According to AHA, some speakers included officers with the Ocala Police Department, who "preached Judeo-Christian religion to the crowd in a style consistent with revivalist and evangelical religion and participated in religious worship, praising God, calling for God's assistance, and encouraging verbal participation and responsive chanting from the crowd."

In November 2014, AHA <u>sued</u> the Department, asserting that its actions "had the effect of favoring and promoting theistic religion, particularly monotheistic religion, over non-theistic religion and beliefs." Read the rest <u>HERE</u>. http://bit.ly/2erwFO9
