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




Coming on Saturday December 7th, our annual celebration of Freethought, Atheism, Humanism, Secularism, and all things and people associated with the movement toward the free mind.

Wrapped in the Flag

For November, we will hear from author, Clair Conner on the imminent danger of right wing extremism. In her new book, Wrapped in the Flag, she discusses her family's history of involvement with the birth of the radical John Birch Society. Her story provides a unique insight into our country's political culture.



Published by Beacon Press, *Wrapped in the Flag* chronicles the radical right wing world of the 1960s when conspiracy ruled and the John Birch Society made national headlines. The daughter of a John Birch Society leader, Claire introduces us to the extreme ideas of a powerful political fringe group dispensing radical solutions to America's problems.

Birchers fought civil rights, labor unions, environmental protections, Medicare, welfare programs, the United Nations and even water fluoridation. Today, the society continues many of those campaigns from its national headquarters in Appleton, Wisconsin. Get a copy at Amazon, Barnes and Noble, or IndieBound

Claire Conner's intimate account—based on records, documents and her firsthand knowledge—takes us deep inside one of the most radical right-wing movements in U.S. history.



NOW is a multi-issue political organization. NOW's self-defined role has been to initiate change for the benefit of the greatest number of people, to affect the legal and institutional structures of the society in a way that systematically expands the choices and possibilities available to all women. In this way, NOW takes action to bring women, as a class, into the mainstream of society, rather than offering aid to individual women in achieving personal solutions or temporary relief from oppression.

The Florida National Organization for Women (NOW) is in strong opposition to the Personhood Amendment ballot initiative for which the organization Personhood Florida is currently collecting signatures, according to Florida NOW president Donna Slutiak. "This amendment is ridiculous and an insult to women," Slutiak said. "The issue of Personhood would have very far reaching results, and would do more than criminalize abortion; it would also make birth control pills and the IUD illegal in the state of Florida. The amendment states that human life begins at the time when an egg is fertilized, which will also impact in-vitro-fertilization clinics. How would you like your mother's fertilized eggs that are sitting in a clinic freezer to have inheritance rights? Do you want to have to go underground to get your birth control pills?" Florida NOW expects all intelligent people to pledge not to sign this initiative, and to vote against it, if by some fluke it does get on the ballot. Personhood is bad for womanhood."



FLORIDA REPORT Civil liberties news in the Sunshine Sta

Now that the standoff that gridlocked Capitol Hill has passed, it's time for our leaders to return their attention to a crisis that is impacting hundreds of thousands here in Florida and millions more across the country. That crisis is a broken immigration system



that hurts economic opportunity, breaks families apart, and forces too many to live in the shadows.

See our interactive report, Florida Voices for Immigration Reform, for firsthand stories from this civil liberties crisis in our state. The report is more than just facts and figures. It's a collection of true, personal, often heartbreaking stories about how our current, broken immigration system is failing Florida.

Secular Coalition for America President, David Niose Wednesday presented oral arguments to the Massachusetts Supreme Court, as the attorney for the plaintiff in the case "Doe v. Acton-Boxborough Regional School District." The case challenges a state law that requires daily school-sponsored and teacher-led classroom recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance. Niose, on behalf of his client,

argued that the wording "under God" in the Pledge discriminates against atheists and other nonbelievers, by instilling and defining patriotism according to a god belief.

Activists have won some important battles in the fight for Florida's clean energy future. It's a fight that has often pitted Florida's families against Big Coal, utility companies, lobbyists -- and even Gov. Richard 'Rick' L. Scott. **Now that fight's about to get a lot bigger.**

President Obama has made tackling **climate-destroying carbon pollution** a priority. As the EPA works to develop strong and just new safeguards protecting us from carbon pollution, they'll be counting on people in states like Florida to help decide the best approach.

Tell Gov. Scott and the EPA that the fight to protect our families, our communities, and our economy from climate disruption has to start with strong and just standards against carbon pollution.


Our nation's aging coal plants are some of the biggest contributors of climate-destroying carbon pollution, as well as toxic waste like mercury, soot, ash, and heavy metals that are harmful even in tiny concentrations. And we can't give a free pass to natural gas -- more gas in the electricity sector just means more pollution. We need strong standards that limit pollution from coal and natural gas-fired power plants, and we need a commitment to true clean energy like wind and solar. Activists like you have shown time and again that Florida is ready to take those steps, even if Gov. Scott refuses to take action.

Already the big polluters are getting organized. They'll try to use their insider influence to continue their free ride. But we can't let their lobbyists and allies -- like Gov. Scott -- drown out the people of Florida who want true action on climate.

Make sure Florida is on the right side of the climate fight.
Tell Gov. Scott and the EPA that Florida wants strong standards against carbon pollution, for the sake of our families, our state, and our future!

Neuroscience and Humanism



Did you know you are your connectome? Your connectome - according to neuroscientist Sebastian Seung - is how your brain's cells connect and talk to one another. This essentially means that conscious experience is both a product of nature and nurture. No surprise there. See Sebastian's wonderful Ted Talk here.

The study of neuroscience is of great interest to most humanists. Not just because we are intellectual geeks who love to learn geeky new sciency things. But also because our brains is where most of our thinking happens. (Most because our neurobiology is actually spread out around our bodies and that impacts our thinking as well. Check out this <u>article on how the vagina and the brain conspire to create consciousness</u>) And yes, I'm betting that pretty much all of you will click on that link.

The reason neuroscience is so interesting to me is because it cuts to the heart of what it is to be human. Our ability to think, feel, experience and be conscious is both a function of and dependent on our neurology. If it turns out that consciousness is an illusion, does that mean we have no free will? And if we have no free will, how can a philosophy, like Humanism which is dependent upon us having free will, claim to have anything useful to say about how we should try to behave?

Adam Gopnik of The New Yorker, reviewed several neurology books on this topic - see this <u>site</u>.. It's a delightful read to catch up on what has been going on and the debates about free will that are occurring within the field of neurology. But I'm mostly referring you to it because Adam concludes that Humanism has nothing to fear from the demystification of the brain. Here is a quote from the article:

"Humanism not only has survived each of these sequential demystifications; they have made it stronger by demonstrating the power of rational inquiry on which humanism depends. Every time the world becomes less mysterious, nature becomes less frightening, and the power of the mind to grasp reality more sure. A constant reduction of mystery to matter, a belief that we can name natural rules we didn't make—that isn't scientism. That's science."

I don't know about you but I get excited whenever I see someone talking about Humanism in a major magazine especially when the topic is so relevant to our concerns as Humanists. Enjoy.







The Magic of Reality

My worldview of Humanism/Atheism/Free thought is a three legged

stool. It consists of (1) philosophy and logic, (2) science (several disciplines), and (3) history and historical evidence (both what we know and what's missing). The argument in this mildly quirky, home brewed essay will be from the philosophy/logic aspect of my worldview.

All arguments and views require some assumptions. The first assumption made is that if an omniscient, omnipotent, providential, interventional and loving deity did exist, then all of the sentient population on earth would accept this deity and follow the edicts of him/ her/it (hereinafter referred to as sheit, a combination of all three pronouns). The God of the Jews, Christians and Muslims is claimed by all three religions to embody this perfect and complete deity. The converse assumption is that such a perfect and complete deity who wants us to know sheit does not exist. Could there be a deity or deities less than perfect or complete? I suppose so, but that's an argument or essay for another day.

What we now know of the cosmos is that planet earth revolves around an average star (no, that is not an oxymoron) in one of the pinwheel bands of the Milky Way galaxy. There are hundreds of billions of stars in our galaxy, and we're now finding any number of planets among those stars, and most probably among the stars of other galaxies.

We know from any number of sources (e.g. the TV show, "Through the Wormhole" and many other science sources) that there are literally billions of galaxies in the universe, each harboring billions of stars. And each star most probably has a number of planets and other types of satellites revolving around it. Thus, it's safe to conjecture that there are trillions and trillions of planets in the cosmos, a number much too large to comprehend. The expanse of the known universe, since the Big Bang, or whatever natural phenomenon may have started our physical universe, may arguably be as large as 47 billion light years.

What are we to make of the ineffable vastness of the cosmos and the nearly infinite numbers of galaxies, stars, planets and other material? For me, the immensity of the universe clearly implies our human insignificance. Our entire planet is smaller than a quark in a proton in the nucleus of an atom of carbon that's embedded in the world's largest coal deposit. That analogy may be hyperbole, or maybe "hypobole", but seven plus billion of us reside on this speck of matter, just like the "Who's" in Dr. Seuss's tale.

And yet, the complete and perfect creator of the cosmos has never had the allegiance of the majority of human inhabitants on planet earth, this unremarkable speck of dust in the hinterlands of the cosmos. Recent figures state that there are about two billion Christians, one billion Muslims, and maybe twelve million or so Jews in the world. Now many of the folks counted as adherents of the three monotheisms clearly have eschewed their faith tradition, or are RINO's, Religionists in Name Only, to borrow a phrase. But even if we take the figures just presented and inflate them by 10% for argument's sake, we're talking about 3.325 billion people, give or take a few million. With a world population of over seven billion, the omnipotent creator still hasn't convinced a majority to believe in sheit.

It's been this way throughout recorded history. Let's take a young earth creationist look at our history. Bishop Ussher of Dublin computed, based upon his reading of the Bible, that the world began in 4004 B.C.E., or 6017 years ago (Y.A.). The question then becomes what percentage of the world's population has historically believed in sheit. I really have no factual evidence on this issue, but I think it's safe to say that it was an infinitesimally small percentage from 6017 Y.A. to approximately 1688 Y.A. (about 325 C.E. if my math is

Why didn't sheit, who loves us and wants us to know and love her/him/it, make himself/herself/itself known to the Chinese and Japanese living 4000 or 2000, or even 600 Y.A.? Why wasn't sheit revealed to Amazonians or Inuit Indians living at the same time? And the aborigines of Australia and the barbarians of Northern Europe: why weren't they clued in?

It is inconceivable to me that any deity who created the Universe can't clearly, unequivocally and irrefragably make himself/herself/itself known to all of sheit's creation on this speck of dust (or quark, if you prefer). I would draw the history of the three western monotheistic adherents as a percentage of world population as follows:

According to the Bible, in the beginning, Adam and Eve and their incestuous children represented all of the World's population. But sometime shortly thereafter even the young earth creationists would be required to admit the vast majority of the spreading world's population came to reject the Judaic deity for the myriad of tribal gods and spirits that archeologists, anthropologists and other social scientists have catalogued. Even accepting the ludicrous "history" of the Pentateuch and biblical literalists, the loss of Judaic adherents would have had to be sudden, dramatic and overwhelming. There are many debatable points in this essay, but that's what it is, an essay, with no pretensions to any type of rigor.

Accepting arguendo, the young earth creationist position that the earth was created only 6017 Years Ago, there may have been a thin line of Judaism among the world's population. In actual fact, there really is no evidence of which I'm aware that there were adherents to Judaism until well after 6017 Y.A.

With the advent of Christianity, the number of monotheistic adherents began to grow, slowly for a couple of centuries, and then more rapidly after the Emperor Constantine proclaimed Christianity as the state religion of the Roman Empire in the early 4th century. At the Council of Nicea in 325 C.E. when the Christ figure was elevated to one of the three emanations of the godhead, Christianity was given a powerful boost. With the birth of Islam in the 7th century, adherence to any one of the three monotheisms spread among the world's population even more rapidly. But, with all of that, the combined total of all three religions appears always to have been a minority of the population on this tiny speck of dust at any given point in time. And I would conjecture that those subscribing to a strong Christian or Judaic view, at least in the secular west, are actually decreasing.

Based upon the previous arguments, and the scientifically demonstrated fact that homo sapiens have existed for well over 100,000 years, it is clear that, in truth, there were no monotheistically inclined religionists, at least of the current three, for well over 94,000 years of human existence. For the reasons stated above, the argument for the deity at the heart of Judaism, Christianity, and Islam abjectly fails the test of universality.


