
How will we meet the future?

President-elect Donald Trump may dismiss the Paris Agreement and pack his cabinet with climate deniers, but once he takes office, he will face a world that takes the climate crisis as seriously as he does not. He will enter a complex web of diplomatic relations, where issues like trade, finance, migration, security, poverty, food aid and disaster relief are all intertwined and all have important links to the climate agenda. It's a world already dealing with significant climate impacts and sold on climate action.

"I am struck by the shift in how the global community puts climate change on its agenda," said <u>Jonathan Pershing</u>, President Obama's special envoy on climate, "It is now virtually everywhere." Since the signing of the Paris Agreement a year ago, addressing climate change has remained a major imperative for most of the world's nations. Enough countries quickly ratified the accord so that it entered into force early, in November. Shortly after Trump's surprising election, delegates from virtually every country in the world <u>gathered</u> <u>in Marrakech to start putting the Paris treaty immediately into action</u>. Most countries also signed on to two other agreements this fall: one to reduce <u>potent greenhouse gases used in refrigeration</u> and another to <u>cap emissions for the aviation industry</u>.

Whatever the U.S. does under Trump, other countries "will move whether or not we are moving forward," Pershing predicted. "It's already built into decisions that are being made," said <u>Timothy</u> <u>Wirth</u>, vice chair of the United Nations Foundation, a former Colorado Senator and a top climate negotiator for former President Clinton. "To try to fight an uphill, rearguard action against the realities of science and climate seems to be a very worthless political exercise. They'd get nothing out it."

Nathaniel Keohane, climate vice president at the Environmental Defense Fund, said that U.S. climate action could be a litmus test to gauge how far the Trump administration is willing to go in other realms of cooperation. It may even become a prime bargaining chip. <u>David Wirth</u>, a law professor at Boston College and a former legal adviser to the State Department said "We would lose leverage. We would create an immense amount of ill-will having taken on these obligations and now saying we are backing off for no obvious benefit."

What the Trump administration will ultimately do on climate change is still unclear, but the evidence keeps piling up that it will be hostile to climate science and action.


Signs of despair

Millions of years is the estimated time required for the planet and its life to recover after feed-back warming has been activated! Donald Trump should know: This is what climate change costs us

Donald J. Trump's transition team recently sent a startling questionnaire to the Department of Energy. Among other things, the questionnaire asked for the names of all employees and contractors who attended meetings of the Interagency Working Group on the Social Cost of Carbon, as well as all emails associated with those meetings, and the department's "opinion" on the underlying issues — a request it essentially refused.

Though Trump's transition team later said that the questionnaire was sent in error, it should be understood in tandem with a leaked memorandum from Thomas Pyle, the leader of the transition's energy team and president of the American Energy Alliance, which promotes "free market" policies. Pyle described the steps the Trump administration will probably take to reduce environmental regulations, including "ending the use of the social cost of carbon in federal rule makings."

If that happens, it will defy law, science and economics. <SNIP>

To be sure, the exact number is uncertain, and the Trump administration will make its own judgment. But a credible assessment must be based on the best science and economics, not politics. And there is no justification for a chilling investigation of civil servants who are just doing their jobs.

Ultimately, the social cost of carbon provides a necessary guidepost in decisions about how to balance costs to our economy today with the coming climate damages. Wishing that we did not face this trade-off will not make it go away.

Any effort to eliminate the social cost of carbon would reflect a neglect of science and economics — and it would be quickly struck down in court.

"Islamophobia" the blasphemy accusation of Western liberals

Is the West today confronted with the return of religious fundamentalism in a new disguise? Yes – but today, it is the mosque instead of the Church that is requesting far-reaching powers. Islamic fundamentalism not only affects Muslim countries, but is also a global problem. Tragic testaments to this fact include, of course, global terror attacks in the name of Islam, such as the recent attack in Nice. Yet also in Europe, we see demands for religiously-justified special wishes of some Muslims, especially in public schools. In this context, it's totally absurd that those who are critical of these demands are accused of "Islamophobia". A reliable method of censorship, Islamists frequently apply this phrase to quickly dispose of any logical or reasoned arguments, while simultaneously making their opponents appear dishonorable.

What's perplexing is that many Western liberals fall repeatedly into this trap. When it comes to Islam, under the banner of multiculturalism and misplaced tolerance, they've come to represent a regressive and even reactionary position.

Would these regressive Leftists take the same position if Christian fundamentalists, for religious reasons, were to demand the segregation of boys and girls in public swimming pools, or a ban on the teaching of boys by female teachers? Islamist ideology is ultimately directed against all that we liberals once loved and held dear: the values of liberty, equality, and fraternity produced by the Enlightenment.



Instead of listening to those regressive Leftists who have played down or even legitimized the Paris terror attacks, Charlie Hebdo, and other incidents, the West should support freethinkers and intellectuals like Elham Manea, Faisal Saeed Al Mutar, Hamed Abdel Samad, and other liberal, secular Muslims and ex-Muslims. These figures are not only better acquainted with Islam, but have lived under religious laws and have had to confront the issue intimately for decades. How to not lose sight of your values when making goals

I come at this both behaviorally and philosophically. I am a Humanist and provide philosophic counselling on goal setting. What I tell people to do is spend some time setting primary, secondary & tertiary goals. Much of what many people are concerned about is focused on tertiary goals, which is why they often lose sight of their primary goals.

Primary Goals

For instance, my primary goal is to live life fully, love other people and leave the world a better place. If I do that, I've succeeded, even if financially I am not in any given moment a financial success. Life is full of ups and downs.

Secondary Goals

My secondary goals are related to the "leave the world a better place" part of my primary goals. I want to help people to stop bullying and learn how to live life without fear of other people. How to make better decisions using critical thinking so that they can actually create strategies that will actually work and help them reach their goals. Having my secondary or business goal grounded in my primary goal of leaving the world a better place helps me not give up even when I want to. My work is too important to not do.

Tertiary Goals

My tertiary goals is – what exactly I'm going to do to accomplish my secondary goals. So in my case, that is – create a learning company that teaches these things. It is only when I get to a tertiary goal that I can really start to develop a strategy to accomplish it. But by making sure my tertiary goal is based in my primary goal, when I create that strategy I do so in a way that honors and incorporates my primary goal – which is to live life fully.

To not get lost in the weeds of the day to day work of trying to make my tertiary goal a reality – I reevaluate every 6 months. Is what I am doing helping me to my primary goals or secondary goals or tertiary goals? Do I need to rethink one of my tertiary goals? Do I need to re-allocate my time and priorities? The answer is ALWAYS yes. Yes I do need to re-prioritize based on what is working and what isn't and whether or not I am enjoying the work or not. I know there are things I should be doing for my business, but if I don't like doing them, I'm not going to do them. Every six months I take stock. What am I doing well, what am I avoiding? If I am avoiding something, which I always am, is there another way for me to accomplish that task without doing it in a way I don't like? If I get creative, the answer is yes. Let me give you an example, I was doing public speaking and I realized I don't like travelling. So I retooled the business to be an online learning program. If people want me – they can take an online class and skype me in if they want a live Q&A. President Obama has signed the Wolf International Religious Freedom Act into law.

(Washington, DC, Dec. 15, 2016)—The American Humanist Association celebrates the passage of HR 1150, the Frank R. Wolf International Religious Freedom Act, in the U.S. Congress, and urges President Obama to sign the bill into law. This legislation supports freedom of thought and religion and protects both theistic and nontheistic beliefs "as well as the right not to profess or practice any religion." If signed into law, it will be the first law that includes the term "non-theist."

The American Humanist Association lobbied both Democrats and Republicans for inclusive language in HR 1150 that would recognize the rights of humanists, atheists and other nonreligious individuals, in addition to defending theistic religious minorities. The Act states that "the freedom of thought, conscience, and religion is understood to protect theistic and non-theistic beliefs as well as the right not to profess or practice any religion." The Act also condemns "specific targeting of non-theists, humanists, and atheists because of their beliefs" and attempts to forcibly compel "non-believers or non-theists to recant their beliefs or to convert." The persecution of openly humanist and atheist writers has become an area of increasing concern especially after the string of murders of secular bloggers and publishers by religious extremists in Bangladesh. The American Humanist Association, along with other international advocates for religious freedom, have also been critical of the flogging of secular writers in Saudi Arabia, as well as a Saudi law that equates atheism with terrorism.

"Legislators are finally recognizing the human dignity of humanists and granting the nontheistic community the same protections and respect that have been given to religious communities," said Roy Speckhardt, executive director of the American Humanist Association. "With the increasing global persecution of humanists and atheists at the hands of religious authoritarians, we're proud that Congress and the US Department of State are standing for the liberty of all people, both religious and non-religious," Speckhardt added, in reference to findings from the recent release of the International Humanist and Ethical Union's 2016 Freedom of Thought report.

"A historic piece of legislation that for the first time in our nation's history recognizes non-theists, the International Religious Freedom Act is the result of extensive advocacy efforts from the humanist community and the support of our religious allies," said Matthew Bulger, legislative director of the American Humanist Association. "Religious freedom for all people, theists and nontheists, is an American value we must protect."

Once signed into law, the International Religious Freedom Act will strengthen the standing of the International Religious Freedom Office and the Ambassador-at-Large for International Religious Freedom, and promote other actions meant to foster religious freedom abroad.

AHA Statement on Peace

Despite our diverse perspectives on societal, ethical, philosophical, and geographical issues, we recognize the freedom, value, and respect to which all of the world's individuals are entitled. The pursuit of peaceful and non-violent strategies for resolving the world's most dire conflicts, which often result in genocide, war, and autocracy, is paramount for human coexistence and progress. Preemptive war, unilateral conflict, arms proliferation, terrorism, and indiscriminate use of force all threaten the common bonds of humanity that we all share.

The AHA believes that cultural exchange, cooperation, peaceful conflict resolution, and diplomacy through multilateral institutions, such as the United Nations, are the most appropriate ways to respect human rights and make the world a safer place for all of its inhabitants. Accordingly, the United States should sign on to the International Criminal Court, abide by and help enforce international law, and push other countries to strengthen the rule of law in their own societies. Furthermore, peace — not war — and respect for international law are the best forces in international and national policy that positively impacts humanity.
